


The LRC staff welcomes Marjorie Johnson to the bookroom. Hours are Monday, Wednesday, Friday 7-11 and Tuesday, Thursday 11-3. If you, or your student, have questions regarding textbooks, please call the bookroom during those hours or Mrs. LaMaster in the LRC during school hours. As a reminder, materials may be checked out in the LRC and the bookroom with a current ID only. If your student has lost an ID, a new one may be purchased for \$5 in the LRC with the accompaniment of a fee sheet.

Twenty-seven computers were added to the LRC this month for class and student use. In combination with two adjacent labs and 15 computers already in the LRC, there are over 100 student access computers. Two older donated computers are in use for assessing the computer card catalog, six are available for video production. Usage is high as many classes visit the library each day. Between October 1st and October 22nd we had 206 classes use the library facilities doing projects ranging from research on censorship, colonies and western civilization to graphic organizers in Inspiration and web pages in FrontPage. Over 2000 walk-in's, from classes and study halls or lunch, also used the library so far in October. Ask your student what projects they've been doing in the LRC.

COOK SELECTED FOR "BE REAL" PROGRAM

Jenny Cook, Class of 2005, has been selected from more than 300 Illinois youths to be a part of "Be Real", the state's new MTV style drug prevention program. Key Club is off to another busy year of community service. Our new Executive Board has implemented an involvement based membership agreement that has encouraged more student to participate and has allowed multiple students some leadership opportunities that were not available previously. With this exciting attitude of commitment, the North Star Key Club has already made itself known in the St. Charles community.

On the weekend of Scarecrow Festival, Key Club volunteered labor hours to help with the information booth and main tent at the festival. That same Saturday, Key Club participated in the Kane County Walk-a-thon supporting mental health. Both experiences were rewarding, even with the inclement weather. In addition to these events, the Key Club has also supported the Boy Scouts of America with their annual Haunted Hike and coordinated a food drive for the National Make-a-Difference Day. On Thursday, October 25th, eight members traveled to the Upstate Eight Leadership Conference in Addison, IL. The students learned about the qualities needed to be an effective leader and how they can bring what they learned "back to North".



Though some might call this after-school activity an organized quarrel, a repeated dispute, or a chaotic sequence of one controversy after another – we prefer the title "*St. Charles North Debate Team*".

St. Charles North Stars participate in a version of debate known as Congressional Debate, which resembles the speaking style and procedure demonstrated by Senators and government officials on programs like CNN or C-SPAN. In fact, during debate, North Stars gain the title of Representatives, instead of students. We debate in chambers, not classrooms. We make motions, whereas we never ask questions.

Representatives are welcome to join throughout the year. Meetings take place every Tuesday, where students discuss events and possible topics for monthly tournaments.

FEELING SAFE TO MOVE FORWARD

Young people who feel threatened, unsafe, or scared often spend a lot of time trapped in fear or in their attempts to try to protect themselves. They're less likely to venture forth and take some risks. On the other hand, children and teenagers who feel safe are more likely to feel secure enough to try new things. That's why safety is an important empowerment asset. Young people who feel safe at home, at school, and in the community are more likely to make positive contributions.

Yet fear is part of childhood and adolescence. Phyllis Tyson, PH.D., a clinical professor of psychiatry, says young people face two types of fear: imaginary fears and reality-based fears. Imaginary fears vary depending on the developmental stage your child is going through. For example, toddlers frequently are frightened of toilets, separation, and loud or strange noises. Preschoolers fear monsters and animals. Fears for teenagers often revolve around injuries, natural events, and social anxieties.

Television, newspapers, and other people fuel reality-based fears, such as crime and accidents. Parents can also add to this sense of insecurity by feeling anxious and believing the world is a dangerous place. Children and teenagers pick up on our body language, our attitudes, and our beliefs – even when we don't articulate them.

"Having fears is normal, and acknowledging, understanding, and learning to deal with them is part of the child's continuing development," Tyson says. It's also important to do our part in ensuring that our homes, our schools, our neighborhoods, and our communities are safe places for children.

On Tuesday, October 9th, the St. Charles North High School Staff participated in several Professional Development Day activities including:

- Writing a Mission Statement: A process in which staff, students, and parents will collaborate to craft a broad statement of the unique purpose for which our organization exists and the specific function which we perform. (We will be seeking participants over the winter months)
- Selecting/Identifying Goals for the School Improvement Plan: Examination of the work and data from the steps outlined above to write goals that identify needs in student performance, address all of our learners, and can be implemented school-wide.

BRIEF NOTES FROM P.P.S.

It is hard to believe that Halloween and the end of the first quarter of school has passed us by and that Thanksgiving is just around the corner! It has been a very positive beginning to what looks to be a very positive year. Students, parents, teachers and Pupil Personnel Staff have worked through the whole range of beginning of the year activities and have settled into a strong pace for the rest of the year.

Counselors have visited all freshmen during their Physical Education classes to review the "Ten Top Tips for a Successful Freshman Year." Juniors and sophomores have also been visited by counselors to review information on the first round of standardized tests. On October 22nd over 325 students took the PSAT, the first of these formal standardized tests of the year. Nearly 250 sophomores are signed up and ready to take the PLAN test on November 10th. The Deans, with the help of the Deans Assistants, have completed the first fire and take cover drills with very positive results. The Deans and the Police Liaison Officer have worked hard to assist the staff and students to establish a safe and orderly environment for the school. The Social Workers and Psychologist have worked with a range of students who have special needs. They have helped a variety of teams to establish proactive plans to support these students' efforts to be successful in school. Our school nurse has collected all the required physical and immunization documents, notified staff of special health concerns of individual students, and is working daily to address the health needs of our students.

In PPS, the focus has shifted from helping students, parents, and staff get their year started to providing the supports they need to complete the year and begin planning for the next. GLOBAL STUDIES

The Spanish III classes at St. Charles North High School recently participated in a $\frac{1}{2}$ day fieldtrip to the St. Charles Heritage Museum. The unit of study in which the students were involved challenged students to describe life where they live, compare life in St. Charles present to life in St. Charles past, and to indicate the advantages or disadvantages to living in St. Charles – all in Spanish!

Throughout a three day period, 170 students total boarded school buses to complete 45 minute shifts at the Heritage Museum, El Puente Mexican Restaurant, and touring the downtown to take digital pictures. The students were each assigned a specific topic to research in the past or the present i.e. parks, schools, buildings/architecture, bridges, climate, population, etc. Each student, then, created a Microsoft Power Point slide (en español!) to present to the class as one succinct Power Point presentation. The slide shows will be donated to the Heritage Museum to use with Hispanic visitors.

We would like to offer our special thanks to the St. Charles Heritage Museum and to El Puente Restaurant for helping our students make real-world connections with their foreign language learning. The Community Unit School District 303 Strategic Plan states that, "We will pursue new and expanded partnerships among the schools and community to best achieve our mission and our objectives." <u>Parent or Guardian State Pupil Transportation Reimbursement</u> <u>for the 2001-02 School Year</u>

Parent(s) or legal guardian(s) who must provide transportation to and from school <u>because free</u> <u>transportation is not available for their children</u> may be eligible to receive money from the state to help offset some of the cost.

If you can answer "yes" to the following questions for the 2001-02 school year, you may be eligible to receive reimbursement for providing such transportation:

- 1) Will the pupil be under the age of 21 years at the close of the school year?
- 2) Is the pupil a full-time student in grades kindergarten through 12?
- 3) Does the pupil either live 1 ½ miles or more from school <u>or</u> live less than 1 ½ miles from school but <u>must be transported</u> due to a serious safety hazard approved by the Illinois Department of Transportation? (See following paragraphs.)
- 4) Does the pupil attend a school within Illinois which meets Illinois compulsory attendance laws?
- 5) Did the parent/guardian incur transportation expenses resulting from transporting the pupil to and from school?

If you answered "yes" to the above questions, lived in Illinois, and wish to file a claim, you must go to the school where each of your children are enrolled by June 30, 2002, to complete a claim application. Claim forms should be available from February, 2002, through June 30, 2002.

In addition, parent(s)/guardian(s) who had pupils living less than 1 ¹/₂ miles from the school attended must verify that a safety hazard due to vehicular traffic exists by completing an Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards. Parents can obtain a copy of the Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards from the Office of the Regional Superintendent of Schools for the county in which they reside **except** parents residing within the City of Chicago. Chicago residents can receive a copy of the Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards from the Illinois State Board of Education, 1000 North First Street, Springfield, IL 62777. All applications for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards must be received no later than February 1, 2002, at the office from which the application was requested. Example: ISBE (Chicago residents), ROE (IL residents other than those residing in Chicago). The Regional Superintendent of Schools is required to send the Application to the Illinois Department of Transportation within 15 days. The Illinois Department of Transportation reviews and approves or denies the application and returns it to the Regional Superintendent of Schools within 30 days. Upon receipt of the reviewed application, the Regional Superintendent of Schools will mail it to the parent/guardian who requested the safety hazard be verified. If the safety hazard is approved, the parent/guardian must go to the school the pupil attends and complete the claim form. Parents who received verification of a safety hazard during and after the 1998-99 school year, whose children attend the same school and live at the same address do not have to reapply for safety hazard verification.

Once all claims are completed at the school, the claim forms will be sent to the Illinois State Board of Education. If your claim is approved, you should receive a check directly from the state for the lesser of the cost of transporting your child/children or the average per pupil reimbursement paid to public schools for transporting regular education pupils. If insufficient funds are appropriated by the General Assembly, all claims will be prorated.
