$\mathcal{N}$ orth $\mathcal{H S}$ is one of twe lve schools nationwide being fonored for its participation in and promotion of the College Board's $\mathcal{A d v a n c e d}$ Placement ( $\mathcal{A P ) ~ P r o g r a m . ~}$

Principal Kesman accepted a Siemens Award on the school's befialf from the Siemens Foundation. The school will receive $\$ 1,000$ and a plaque.

The Siemens Foundation fonors students, teachers and schools who have achieved excellence on the $\mathcal{A P}$ tests to support and promote mathematics, science and tecfnology education. Those tests assess students' Knowledge in science and mathematics courses at all grade levels in United States figh schools.

The Foundation also honors schools which have shown notable improvement in $\mathcal{A P}$ enrollment and performance. $\mathcal{T h e} \mathcal{A P}$ tests students in these mathematical and science subjects: biology, calculus, chemistry, computer science, environmental science, physics and statistics.
$\mathcal{T}$ wo years ago $S$ t. Charles $\mathcal{N}$ (orth offered four $\mathfrak{A P}$ tests. This past school year the high school offered all nine of the $\mathcal{A P}$ science and mathematics tests that are offered. Two years ago, $25 \mathcal{N}$ orth students took $\mathcal{A P}$ exams, while this past year, that number jumped to 147.


#### Abstract

Some of that improvement is due to $\mathcal{N}$ (orth having a smaller population two years ago because it did not have a senior class. S till, College Board officials believe the achieve ment is notable because it shows $\mathcal{N}$ orth Higf School's efforts to promote the $\mathcal{A P} \mathcal{P r o g r a m}$ among its students.


$\mathcal{N}$ (orth has sent teachers to summer workshops so that they could learn to teach the $\mathcal{A P}$ Program in the most effective way consistent with College Board expectations. "There is an overall emphasis on excellence in this district and at our school," Kesman said. "I am very proud of the fact that we re a young school and able to receive this recognition." "Ihere has been a lot of hard work on the part of a lot of staff and commitment to our students and the overall program, and we look forward to continued success in the future."

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program lets students take challenging college-level courses while still in high school for college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams.

The following students were named AP Scholars (received grades of 3 or higher on 3 or more AP Exams on full-year courses: Marie Diana Alhambra, Kenneth Chakour, Heather Dague, Justin Havens, Anneka Pryce, Corgan Tvrdik.

The following students were named AP Scholars with Honor (earned an average grade of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on 4 or more of these exams: Gregory Fenton, Matthew Gill.

Almost 15 percent of the more than one million high school students in more than 14,000 secondary schools worldwide who took AP Exams earned the "AP Scholar" accolade, according to a College Board press release.

Students took AP Exams in May 2003 after completing challenging college level courses at their high schools. The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on the number of yearlong courses and exams.

Prentiss is quoted as saying "I've been blessed with a lengthy career and outstanding players, and my peers must think a lot of me to give me this honor."

The Transition Plan brings together students, parents, teachers, potential employers, and representatives from higher education in order to build a plan that will cultivate meaningful results.

We are always looking for community members that would like to provide opportunities that broaden our students' experiences. These experiences allow students multiple situations in which to build skills that will lead to success in the future.

## FRESHMAN-SOPHOMORE-J UNI OR CLASS NOTES


$\mathcal{B e}$ low is important information for Fresfimen, Sophomores, and Iuniors regarding the timelines for selecting courses for the 2004-05 school year. While this process officially begins with Curriculum Day on ganuary $20^{\text {th }}$, students and parents are encouraged to begin the process immediately by discussing as a family the student's career and educationalgoals beyond high school.

- Late $\mathcal{N}$ Lovember, December and early Ianuary: Parents and Students Review Their Four- Year $\mathcal{P l u s} \mathcal{P l a n}$. The first step in the 4-Year Plus Plan review is the Plus. This means thinking beyond figh school to set a generalgoalfor what you want to do the first few years after graduation. Fresfiman, this process connects the career awareness work you did in middle schools and your revie w of your individual Explore results with the choices and goals you made with the fielp of your parents as you entered high school. Sophomores, you should be narrowing these options as yourevie wour high school course experiences and the results of your $\mathcal{P L A} \mathcal{A}$ test that will be available in December. I uniors, you should be well on your way to significantly narrowing your fields of choice as you reflect upon your work in the career research unit taught in your sophomore English class and you begin the process of searching for post high school career and educational opportunities. All students sfould work to bring their general career goals and the kind of education or training that is needed to achieve these goals into sharper focus. By doing this, the connections between school and the world of work become stronger; and, these connections provide increased motivation toward success in figh school.

REGISTRATION $\mathcal{F O R}$ THE 2004-2005SCHOOL $\mathcal{S E A R}$ (Cont'd)
Your 4-Ye ar Plus Plan will likely change as you le arn more about your own skills and interests and the post-high school careers and educational opportunities available to you. Revie wing this goal annually helps you trackyour progress and make adjustments as necessary. The second step is to fill in any revisions to the tentative sequences of required and elective courses you plan to take to get you to your Plus goal. A careful review of the courses you have taken and your progress toward completing graduation requirements will help you select the courses needed to reach your goal. Matching elective choices to your career goal, the requirements of the colleges or training schools, and your own special interests will help you keep your four-year plan current. Students who set clear goals, develop plans to meet their goals, and monitor their progress along the way greatly enfance the ir chances for success in figh school and beyond.

- Ianuary 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ : Curriculum Overview Day. During the first day of second semester students attend each of their first semester classes one more time. In their $i^{t}$ four classes they should Gring their copies of the Course Offering Booklet to school. Their first hour teachers will provide them Curriculum $\mathcal{D a y}$ Worksheets on which to get recommendations from their current teachers regarding the next courses they should take. Throughout the day they receive information regarding the next courses in the sequences they are taking and elective options, including: pre. requisite skills, course expectations, types of assignments and other information to help them make good decisions. Students note courses of interest on their Curriculum Day Worksheets. Teachers review the student's choices and provide informal advisement regarding their choices. The students turn in a copy of their Curriculum Day worksheets during their last hour class and take the second copy home to share with their parents. It is strongly recommended that parents discuss with their student the courses selected by the student and any informal recommendations that the teachers may have made. The Curriculum Day Worksheet is not the final Course Request Form used by the student to request courses. It is designed to be a tool that helps students and their parents consider course options and to obtain informal teacher advisement before making final decisions regarding the courses they will request.
- Ianuary 21 $1^{\text {st: }}$ Counselors Meet with each Class to Review Completion of the Course Request $\mathcal{F o r m}$. The counselors will meet with all freshmen during $1^{\text {st }}$ period, sophomores during $2^{\text {nd }}$ period, and juniors during $3^{\text {rd }}$ period on this day to review the registration process, fiow to complete the Course Request Form, and to answer questions students might have about the process. Each student will be given an official Course Request form on which to list the courses they want.
- Ianuary $26^{\text {th }}$ - February $4^{\text {th }}$ : Individual Students Meet with Counselors to Make Final Course Requests. The counselors will meet briefly with individual juniors on ganuary $26^{\text {th }}$ and $27^{\text {th }}$, sophomores on ganuary $28^{\text {th }}$ and $29^{\text {th }}$, and freskmen on $\operatorname{g}$ anuary $30^{\text {th }}$ and $\mathcal{F e}$ bruary $2^{\text {thd }}$. Sy these dates students should have their Course Request forms completed, including the three alternative electives. Counselors will revieweach student's course requests, answer any final questions, and enter their requests into the computer. Students should come to those meetings prepared with their course request form completed and signed by a parent, prepared to ask any final questions, and prepared to make their finalcourse choices for next year.


## REGISTRATION FOR THE 2004-2005 SCHOOL $\mathcal{G E A R}$ (Cont'd)

- February $9^{\text {th }}: \mathcal{D e}$ adine for Completing Registration Form. February $9^{\text {th }}$ is the last day for students who may have missed the initial meetings to turn in the ir registration forms. Forms should be completely filled out, including selected alternative electives and parent signature. Students who have not turned in their forms should turn them into the guidance office by the end of the day.
- By February 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ : Course Verification Letters are Sent. On or Gefore February $20^{t h}$ letters that verify the courses the student has requested will be mailed to all students and their parents. Students and parents have until March $12^{\text {th }}$ to request course changes for the 2003-2004 school year. It is extremely important that parents and students carefully review the courses listed on this verification letter to be absolutely sure they are the courses wanted for the following year. After March $12^{\text {th }}$ requests for course changes will not be made unless a clerical error has been made or a master schedule conflict requires the selection of a different course.
- March $12^{\text {th }}$ : Deadine for requesting any course changes. The complexity of building the master schedule makes this March $12^{\text {th }}$ deadine the last date to make course request changes. An accurate accounting of the number of students selecting particular courses is necessary to determine which courses will be offered and the teachers that are necessary for these courses. After the March deadline changes will be made only if there is a clericalerror or if a master schedule conflict requires the selection of a different course.
- April: Schedule Conflicts are Resolved. Once the master schedule is built students may be notified that they will have to select alternative courses because the courses requested did not have sufficient enrollment to be offered or they could not be fit into their schedule. Students then select courses from the alternative elective courses that they identified on their course request form. This again underscores the importance of listing alternative courses on the course request form. Failure to list alternative electives could result in lost opportunities for the courses you would rather take.
- Late Iune - Mid Iuly: Fee Sheets. During late Iune to mid guly the sheets indicating the fees owed are mailed to each student. Payment is required before students may pickup the ir final schedule in $\mathcal{A} u g u s t$.

## No REALLY! Finish Strong!

The best advice for your senior year continues to be "Do not miscalculate." Make sure you know exactly where you are in each of your classes. Leave no room for error. Remember that final admission and entry into the college or career of your choice is contingent upon a final transcript that meets the college's or employer's expectations. The jobs that await you require that you finish high school; and, if you want to be competitive in a tight job market, you must finish strong.

There are many wonderful senior activities ahead for you! You need to maintain that focus and balance to get it all done.

## College Application Process

It is important that seniors follow the College Application Process to assure that your applications arrive on time. Remember that it is extremely important to turn your applications in a minimum of two weeks before the due date. Applications due by January $1^{\text {st }}$ must be received in the Guidance Office one week before the winter holiday break begins to ensure that they are received on time. If a counselor recommendation is requested, they must be turned in a minimum of two weeks before the holiday break. Because of the volume of applications that are processed, students who do not follow these guidelines run a very real risk of not getting their applications processed by the college's deadlines.

## JUNIOR CLASS NOTES

## ExcelEdge ACT 36 Test Preparation Program

Designed for college-bound juniors, ACT 36 is a test preparation program that will be offered at St. Charles North High School this coming winter-spring. The classes will allow students to develop confidence about the ACT by helping students analyze this pre-college test, practice with test questions, and master the pacing required to complete the exam. The eight-week, 18-hour course will be offered on Monday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00. The classes will begin on January 26 and will end on March 22. Classes will not meet on February 16, Presidents' Day. St. Charles North Hgh School juniors may take the ACT on April 3. They will take it again as part of the Prairie State Achievement Exam on April 28.

ACT 36 has been created by ExcelEdge, Inc., a private test preparation company that has worked with many top Illinois high schools for almost two decades. The Excel course will cover all four ACT content areas: English, math, reading and science reasoning. The course will conclude with a full-length practice test and test review.

ACT 36 registration packets will be mailed to St. Charles North juniors in November. Students may enroll in ACT 36 by completing the ExcelEdge registration packet, including a check for $\$ 172$, and bringing the registration form and attached check to the Guidance Office by December 12. All students who register on time are guaranteed a spot in the program, and class lists with room assignments will be posted in the Guidance Office the week before classes begin. ## The Huntington Exam Prep Center Offers an SAT Prep Course at North

The Huntington Exam Prep Center is pleased to provide a 34 -hour Prep Course for students at St. Charles North High School.

The SAT is a standardized test that measures the verbal and math skills needed for college-level work. SAT scores are a major part of the college admissions process. The higher your score, the better your chance of getting into the school of your choice.

The best way to get ready for the SAT is to actively prepare. The Huntington Exam Prep Center will be offering the SAT Prep Course on Tuesday Evenings. The classes will be held at St. Charles North High School from 6:30-8:30 p.m. beginning on Tuesday, January 20, 2004 and ending on Tuesday, April 27, 2004.

The Huntington 34-hour SAT Prep Course will include:

- Two actual SAT practice exams, pinpointing student's strengths and weaknesses in math, verbal and writing skills.
- Verbal, math, and writing instruction by certified teachers.
- Reading, testing, and time-management strategies.

Tuition, materials, and registration fee is $\$ 375$. The total cost of the course is due at the time of the first practice exam. The registration deadline is Friday December 19, 2003.

## SOPHOMORE CLASS NOTES

The PLAN Test Review. A presentation to assist sophomores who took the PLAN Test on Saturday November 15, 2003 will be held on January $8^{\text {th }}$. PLAN results provide an estimated range of a student's ACT Assessment composite scores, information regarding a student's relative strengths and areas for improvement for the ACT, and valuable career interests information. The PLAN interpretation meeting to help sophomores and their parents better understand and use the results to prepare for both the ACT and making important career decisions.

## Transportation Reimbursement Information for 2003-04 School Year

Parent(s) or legal guardians(s) who must provide transportation to and from school because free transportation is not available for their children may be eligible to receive money from the state to help offset some of the cost, for example, bus fares, or mileage reimbursement for private automobiles at .36 cents per mile.

If you can answer yes to the following questions for the 2003-04 school year, you may be eligible to receive reimbursement for providing such transportation.

1. Will the pupil be under the age of 21 at the close of the school year?
2. Is the pupil a full-time student in grades kindergarten through 12 ?
3. Does the pupil either live $11 / 2$ miles or more from school or live less than $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from school but must be transported due to a serious safety hazard approved by the lllinois Department of Transportation? (See following paragraphs)
4. Does the pupil attend a school within Illinois which meets Illinois compulsory attendance laws ?
5. Did the parent/guardian incur transportation expenses resulting from transporting the pupil to and from school ?

If you answered yes to the above questions, lived in Illinois and wish to file a claim, you must go to the school where each of you children is enrolled by June 30, 2004, to submit claim information. You may provide claim information to appropriate school personnel at your child's attendance center until June 30, 2004.

In addition, parent(s)/guardian(s) who have pupils living less than $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from the school attended must verify that a safety hazard due to vehicular traffic exits by completing an Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards. Parents can obtain a copy of the Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards from the Office of the Regional Superintendent of Schools for the county in which they reside except parents residing within the City of Chicago. Chicago residents can receive a copy of the Application for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards from the Illinois State Board of Education, Division of Funding and Disbursement Services, 100 North First Street, Springfield, IL 62777. All applications for Determination of Serious Safety Hazards must be received no later than February 1, 2004, at the office from which the application was requested. Example: ISBE (Chicago residents). ROE (Illinois residents other than those residing in Chicago). The Regional Superintendent of Schools is required to send the Application to the Illinois Department of Transportation within 15 days. The Illinois Department of Transportation reviews and approves or denies the application and returns it to the Regional Superintendent of Schools within 30 days. Upon receipt of the reviewed application, the Regional Superintendent of Schools will mail it to the parent/guardian who requested the safety hazard be verified. If the safety hazard is approved, the parent/guardian must go to the school the pupil attends to submit claim information. Parents who received verification of a safety hazard during and after the 2000-01 school year, whose children attend the same school and live at the same address do not have to reapply for safety hazard verification.

Once all claim information is submitted at the school, it will be transmitted electronically to the Illinois State Board of Education. If your claim information is approved, you should receive a check directly from the state for the lesser of the cost of transporting your child/children or the average per pupil reimbursement paid to public schools for transporting regular education pupils. If insufficient funds are appropriated by the General Assembly, all claims will be prorated.
