During the dedication, student Maddie Lehman was asked to hold the flag during the Pledge of Allegiance and sophomore of "God Bless America" by sophomore, Evan Bravos.

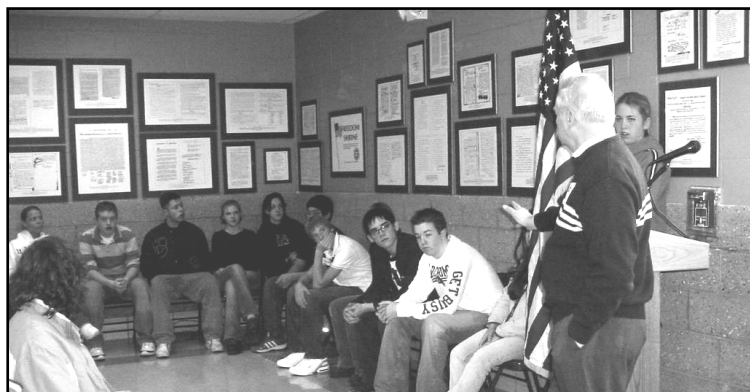

Pfeiffer is Alice Davis Award Recipient

Each year the Heritage Center recognizes high school students with the Alice Davis Award, an honor presented to those who exemplify scholarly, historical research by using primary sources of a local nature in a research paper or project.

The award is named after Alice Davis (1884-1966) a significant local historian, teacher, and principal who dedicated more than 50 years to the St. Charles school system.

Ian Pfeiffer is the St. Charles North High School recipient of the Alice Davis Award. Ian researched the St. Charles School For Boys and completed a PowerPoint presentation on it. Nan Gacek from the St. Charles Heritage Center assisted in his research, viewed his presentation, and recommended him to the St. Charles Heritage Center Board for the award.

The Heritage Center presented Ian a certificate and a check for \$100. Congratulations to Ian on his accomplishment.

National Leadership Award to Kartha

Mr. Kesman has nominated senior Nirupa Kartha to compete in the National Principal's Leadership Award Program, sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The PLA Award is made possible through a contribution by Herff Jones, Inc. One hundred-fifty PLA winners from across the country will receive \$1,000 in college scholarships.

"Character, leadership and service are the qualities that lend themselves to successful schools and student relations. Nirupa has these personal qualities and leaves a lasting impression that sets her apart from her peers," Kesman said.

Nominees were selected based on their leadership skills, participation in service organizations and clubs; achievements in the arts and sciences; employment experience; and academic record. They also were required to write an essay.

Nirupa plans to major in college in international studies/international law.

Venegas Receives Nat'l Hispanic Recognition

Congratulations to senior Katherine Venegas who has been recognized by the College Board's National Hispanic Recognition Program.

The National Hispanic Recognition Program, established in 1983, provides national recognition of the exceptional academic achievements of Hispanic high school seniors and identifies them for post secondary institutions.

Students enter this recognition program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test as high school juniors and by identifying themselves as Hispanic. From more than 124,000 students nationwide, approximately 4,300 highest scoring students were initially identified. Based on further evidence of their academic achievement, a select group of 3,300 students have been recognized by the program as a Scholar or Honorable Mention Finalist.

Students Experience Great Success at Area DECA Competition

On January 27th, thirty St. Charles North Students took part in the Area 20 DECA Competition held at Charlestowne Mall. Every year over 500 students from 20 area high schools come together to compete in 15 different events in the area of Marketing and Management.

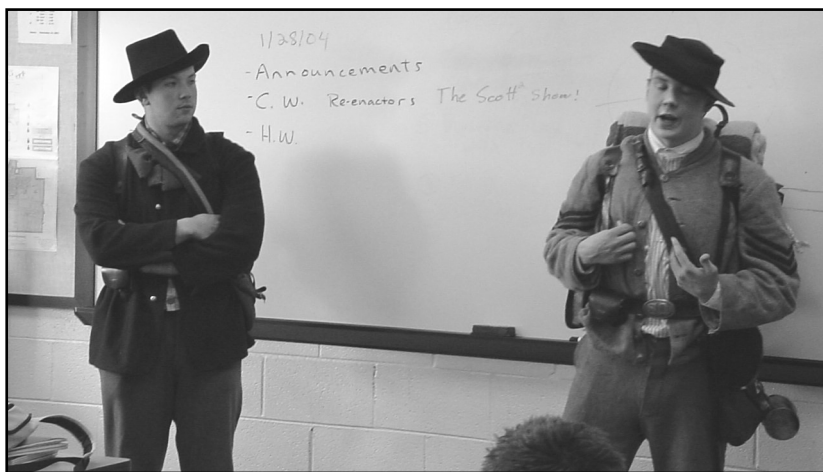
Civil War Comes to Life

Searching for the University of Your Dreams!

Wednesday, March 24, 2004 Dr. Robert Freitag will present an evening designed to help juniors and their parents learn how to find the "University of Your Dreams." This presentation will be held from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. in the Auditorium at North. This comprehensive 2-hour guide to the college search and selection process will provide students and parents with a clear road map to follow while exploring and choosing the college that best meets the student's and family's needs. While this presentation is designed for juniors and their parents, other students and their parents are welcome to attend and will benefit from the information.

Prairie State Achievement Examinations are April 28th and 29th

On April 28th and 29th all juniors at St. Charles North High School will take the Prairie State Achievement Exam (PSAE). The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) requires that all schools give the PSAE to their juniors in order to:

- Assess the extent to which students in the eleventh grade are meeting the Illinois Learning Standards, that is, the specific knowledge and skills that students should learn in Illinois public schools,
- Provide for school accountability, and
- Recognize the achievement of individual students in meeting the learning standards.

The PSAE Test include the following components:

Day 1:	ACT Assessment English – 45 minutes (75 questions)
	ACT Assessment Mathematics – 60 minutes (60 questions)
	15 minute break
	ACT Assessment Reading – 35 minutes (40 questions)
	ACT Assessment Science Reasoning – 35 minutes (40 Questions)

Prairie State Achievement Examinations are April 28th and 29th (cont'd)

Day 2: ISBE-Developed Writing – 40 minutes (one writing prompt)
ISBE-Developed Science – 40 minutes (40 questions)
15-minute break
Work Keys Applied Mathematics – 45 minutes (33 questions)
Work Keys Reading for Information – 60 minutes (60 questions)
15 to 60 minute break
ISBE-Developed Social Science – 60 minutes (65 questions)

Information regarding preparing for the test will be distributed to students and staff members the week of February 9th. Test preparation materials designed to help students prepare to do their best on the test are available in the Learning Resource Center. Many teachers will provide their students helpful test preparation tips.

The requirements for conducting the PSAE will make April 28th and 29th unique days for all students and staff at St. Charles North. During these two days there will be a number of adjustments in the normal operations of the school. On these two days juniors will be dismissed from school at the end of the testing. Both April 28th and 29th will be non-attendance days for seniors.

It is very important that each junior does his or her very best on this exam. The individual scores from each of the five PSAE subjects are listed on the student's transcript. Students have the opportunity to earned Prairie State Achievement Awards and to have those awards listed on their transcript. ACT Assessment scores from the PSAE can be listed on a student's transcript and can be used by colleges for admissions and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission to determine financial aid.

Senior Class Notes

Final Tips for Seniors!

Congratulations once again for being in the final semester of your high school experience! Below are the final tips that were shared during the senior exit assembly on January 20th.

1. As it has been said over and over, it is very important that you finish strong and do your best possible work so that your final transcript reflects your best achievement.
2. Seniors are cautioned against dropping any course during their last semester. Before dropping a course, students should consult with the colleges to which they have been accepted in order to determine what impact that might have on their admissions status. Colleges may revoke admissions if a student does not complete the course of study they listed on their application forms.
3. Seniors who have applied to selective schools should check to be sure that the mid-year reports have been sent to these schools.
4. Seniors planning to participate in college athletics should be certain that they have their NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearing House information completed.
5. If you are applying for scholarships, be sure they are turned in on time. See Mrs. Porter in the guidance office to check for updates.
6. If you are receiving a scholarship and would like to be recognized at the Senior Awards night, be sure to notify Mrs. Porter.
7. Students completing pre-approved correspondence courses should be careful to finish all work by the deadlines so that a transcript from the school is received in time to be counted toward graduation.
8. In mid-May counselors will meet with you in a final "Senior Good-bye" meeting. You will be able to order your free final transcript at that time.
9. Do not miscalculate! Know exactly where you are in each class and what you must do to meet graduation requirements!

PSAE Attendance Waivers for Seniors

On the dates of the Prairie State Achievement Examinations, Wednesday April 28th and Thursday April 29th, seniors are not required to be in attendance. A waiver from the State of Illinois was obtained last year that allows for the PSAE testing dates to be non-attendance days for all seniors. It is recommended that these dates be used to make final college visits, prepare resumes, or catch up on school projects.

Career Cruising Can Help You Write Your Resume!

Seniors who are preparing to seek employment immediately after or just before graduation should be aware that career Cruising.com can help them create their resume. Career Cruising is an online career and college search resource that provides all North students will an opportunity to assess their areas of career interests, locate information on careers that match those interests, and develop a personalized career portfolio that includes writing a resume. North students can access career Cruising.com from their home computer by using the username "North" and the password "high". If you need assistance in using the program see your counselor.

This special evening is to honor those students who are National Merit Scholars, Illinois State Scholars, Academic high honors (those in the top 25% of their class), and students receiving scholarships or awards from colleges or businesses. 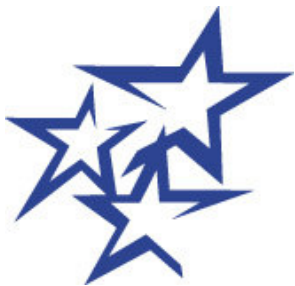
