and interacted with such a diverse group of people from different backgrounds and with different strengths and talents. I also must say that I feel some sadness at knowing that my time with the recently graduated seniors has drawn to an end because I know the four years I served as their class advisor have touched me in ways that I cannot yet imagine. I know that I will look back on these last four years with much nostalgia, pride, and many fond memories because I know that whatever impressions I have made on these graduates, only a handful of them can know the ways that I have grown from working with them.

CURRICULUM CORNER

"Teaching should be such that what is offered is perceived as a valuable gift and not as a hard duty."

Einstein's quote points to the importance of designing learning experiences for students that are engaging and relevant. As a group of professional educators we continue to ask ourselves - what new curriculum, instruction, and assessment practices can be put in place to achieve new / improved results in student learning?

The culture and climate of STC North is one where teachers, not just students, learn. Here, teachers focus on their own practice and their conversations center on the direction in which the curriculum can lead student thinking. They try new approaches, monitor the effects, and reflect on the successes and failures. In brief, improvements in teaching and learning are nurtured and supported by our culture of collegiality and innovation.

Examples of summer curriculum and course work in which a variety of STC North staff will participate include:

- Teambuilding course, an opportunity for all North team teachers to build/strengthen personal and professional relationships, to refine course structures and objectives, to establish purposeful roles, and to begin to co-plan curriculum.
- Advanced Placement Training, teachers from Biology, Calculus, and Statistics will attend extended AP Conferences held at local Universities to learn about new curriculum frameworks and innovative testing protocols.
- RRC Challenge Course; staff members will explore a
 wide variety of practical diagnostic, interventive, and
 preventative strategies for managing today's classroom
 and re-directing challenging behaviors toward
 respectful, responsible, and cooperative participation.
- Understanding by Design Course; In this course teachers will explore answers to the questions; "How will we know that students truly understand and can apply their knowledge in a meaningful way?" and "What instructional strategies are both engaging and effective for developing student understanding?"

- Assessment Camp at North HS; new and experienced STN teachers will examine current research and create high quality assessment tools that are aligned with fair grading practices.
- Classroom Instruction That Works, participants will
 investigate research-based strategies for increasing
 student achievement and will examine classroom
 examples of teachers and students in action' models of
 successful instruction; and many rubrics, organizers,
 and charts to help teachers plan and implement the
 strategies.
- Graduate course work at local Universities

Excellence Through Collaboration - ETC Update

Improvements for FALL 2004:

- The length of time teachers have to meet and collaborate has been extended from 45 minutes to 60 minutes.
- The process/guidelines used to help teacher teams identify goals and work toward effective implementation have been revised to more clearly focus on classroom practice and student learning.

- Each ETC session will begin a 7:00 am and end at 8:00 am.
- Classes will begin at 8:18 am and end at 2:21 pm, with P1-8 meeting for 40 min each.
- ETC will continue to meet two times each month.

Freshman Physicals Are Required!

Dear Parents of incoming ninth grade students:

This is a reminder that a physical examination current immunization records are required in order for your child to enroll in school AND START THE FIRST DAY. Our procedure has changed from previous years, in that formerly, students given until October 15 to with comply this State mandate. This is no longer the case, and your child's physical exam must be on file with the Nurse's office before the first day of school.

To ensure that it is received, it is strongly recommended that you hand a copy of your child's physical examination directly to the school nurse, or mail it to her attention. The school nurse will be in the health office two weeks before the beginning of school, which will provide you time to hand in the physical examination to her.

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New Athletic Director Named

A committee of North High School staff, students, and parents have chosen John Rutter from a field of 30 candidates as the new Athletic Director for STC North. Rutter is a 20-year veteran educator and coach. Currently Rutter is the Athletic Director and Activities Director at Addison Trail High School, and he will officially begin his new job at North HS on July 1st.

Principal Kesman stated that "John brings several years of experience to our program as an Athletic Director at a large high school as well as several years of experience as a head coach. That experience will help him mentor our younger coaches. Plus, his previous work in District 303 should add to the strong relationship that exists between North and East High Schools."

Rutter worked in District 303 where he taught physical education from 1989-94 at Anderson Elementary School and from 1994-98 at Thompson Middle School. He also served as head softball and assistant football coach at St. Charles East High School.

"It's a community my wife and I grew very fond of when we were there," Rutter said. "I'm very familiar with a lot of the people, and there are no finer people to work with than the ones I'll be joining soon."

Rutter's education career began in 1984 as a physical education teacher at Hinsdale South High School in Darien, where he worked for five years. He also served as head basketball coach from 1996-98 at Kaneland High School in Maple Park. From 1998-2000, John worked as a counselor, dean, and head basketball coach at Riverside Brookfield High School in Riverside, Illinois.

Rutter replaces David Hicks, who leaves after one year in the position.

"I very much appreciate the service that Dave provided to our students and athletic program," Kesman said. "We wish him well in his future endeavors."





Cite Those Sources!

The North LRC staff members have worked with teachers in various classes to emphasize the importance of proper source citation, whether from print or online resources. Students use a book titled Writers Inc. in addition to small "fill in the blank" sheets available in the LRC to help them prepare a list of the sources used for a particular project. The citations may be part of the documents produced for a project, or an attachment to that project, depending upon the format used. Recent brochures produced by biology and health classes included the citations as one of the panels of each student's tri-fold brochure.

Busy Place

"Busy and crowded" can easily describe the LRC this year. Recent statistics for use of the LRC indicates that teachers and students are using the facility in greater numbers than last year. For example, in March and April of this year, the LRC averaged just fewer than 27 classes and 25 classes per day. These numbers are up for the same time period last year, as well as higher than the previous 4 months of the school year. The high usage again indicates the LRC is an essential component to the academic setting at St. Charles North High School.

North Does Well at SkillsUSA-VICA Event

Four St. Charles North High School students brought home awards from the recent state annual Illinois Association of SkillsUSA-VICA Leadership and Skills Conference.

The state conference, held in Springfield on April 22-24, included more than 1200 registered participants. Nearly 300 business and industry, organized labor and educational professionals, supervised and judged the competition and provided technical support.

The students participated in 14 leadership development contests, 51 technical, skilled and service occupations contests, six health contests, nine action skills contests for special needs students and four occupationally related contests.

SkillsUSA-VICA is a national, state, regional and local organization for technical, skilled, health and personal service occupations students in high school and community college. It has nearly 265,000 members in over 13,000 chapters in 55 states and territorial associations, including the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa and the Virgin Islands.

This year, Mark Figura did something no other St. Charles North student has done before, taking home a national 3rd place honors in the Vehicles and Petroleum Marketing Event. Figura received medals, a trophy, and a scholarship from NAPA Auto Parts, the sponsor of the event. Greg Stinton and Katie Kurtz received competency honors for their work in the Hospitality Management Team event. Eric Jamison, Cory Jacoby, and Morgan Andrews also received competency awards in the areas of Sports and Entertainment Marketing and Food Marketing. Laura Molitor, David Williams, Bryan Place, and Imran Kanchwala also represented North High School at this year's competition.

DECA is one of the premier business education clubs for high school students in the United States. Over 10,000 of the best and brightest business and marketing students throughout the US and Canada traveled to Nashville to compete in the event. Each individual event consists of over 200 students who qualified for nationals through their state competition earlier this year.

The students involved in the competition were asked to complete an exam in their event area, as well as present their answers to case study situations to judges. Corporations such as JC Penny and NAPA sponsor many of the events. These corporations supply business professionals to judge the students at the competition.

Pupil Personnel Services has provided a wide array of high quality services during this last quarter of the 2003-2004 school year.

- Course selections for over 2002 students were made into individual student schedules.
- In March Dr. Freitag gave an evening presentation to 200 students and parents that outlined the major considerations in identifying and applying to college.
- Counselors and English II teachers provided a Career Guidance unit to all sophomores.
- In April St. Charles North hosted over 180 colleges and university representatives and nearly 2000 students and parents at the annual Fox Valley College Fair.
- On April 28th and 29th 440 juniors took part in the third annual Prairie State Achievement Examinations while 530 freshmen and 500 sophomores were trained in the use of the newly acquired online *Discover* career and college search program from ACT.
- From May 3rd to May 21st over 150 students took a total of 233 Advanced Placement Exams covering a total of 14 disciplines.
- The PPS Teams (e.g. counselors, social workers, psychologist, nurse, deans, student assistance counselor, and teachers) have continued their efforts to identify ways to help students to achieve success in high school.
- Individual counselors have made thousands of contacts with students to assist them with their academic planning, career and college planning, and social-emotional growth.
- On May 17th counselors met with seniors to do a final senior review of their status and the transition they will make to life after high school.

The New Senior Class of 2005

You have made it to the final stretch of your high school career! This year will be one of the most important years of your life. It is the time that you will be making important decisions regarding careers and colleges. It is a year that will require focus, balance, and effort to have a strong finish to your high school career. Students who have a strong academic schedule and work hard to do well in these courses keep the doors to opportunities after high school wide open. Students who choose to take weak schedules and who apply less effort frequently find that they close the doors to many opportunities.

The best advice for your senior year is, "Do not miscalculate." Near the beginning of the school year you will receive a senior mailing that will provide you important information for your senior year, including a current transcript of courses taken. Double check the courses listed on your transcripts against the requirements for graduation. If you have questions, contact your counselor. It is extremely important that you know exactly what you need to graduate.

Career and College Search

You should have a very good idea of the kind of career in which you are most interested. However, there are many resources that can assist you this summer.

- You can access <u>careercruising.com</u> by using the username "north" and password "high." Careercruising.com offers interest inventories that can help you identify career areas of interest to you and the colleges that best serve those career areas.
- You may also access ACT's Discover Program by:
 - Logging on to http://actrs19.act.org/discover/eDISCOVER/
 - Then entering SCNHS-your student ID number in the User ID box and leave the Password box blank, and click submit.
 - o It will ask you to complete a user profile form before you can enter the program.

Summer is also an excellent time to do college visits that will help you narrow your choices.

NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse

The NCAA requires all new college athletes who want to compete in Division I or II athletics to meet specific initial eligibility requirements. To help our students better understand these requirements, *Coach Bobbie Cesarek*, Northern Illinois University's NCAA Compliance Director has again been invited to speak to all District 303 high school athletes regarding the initial eligibility requirements during *late September*. You can also obtain information on the Initial Eligibility requirements and complete the application online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. NCAA requires that you forward a transcript with your application.

PSAE Retakes

This summer you will receive your Prairie State Examination Scores, including your ACT, PSAE, and WorkKeys scores. The State of Illinois allows seniors the opportunity to improve their PSAE scores by retaking both days of the PSAE in October. Once you receive your PSAE results, you should decide if your scores are satisfactory. If you choose to retake the test, notify Dr. Lane in the Guidance Office and request a voucher for the testing. The retake tests will be on October 23rd (ACT) and October 26th (Prairie State Exams and WorkKeys). Students who were unable to take the PSAE tests in the Spring of 2004, may retake the tests in October. Students must take both days if they choose the retake option.

Generally, students who carefully review their test results and take positive steps to strengthen their performance. If you think your scores do not reflect your actual achievement and you are willing to work to improve your performance on the tests, retaking the test may be worthwhile.

The New Juniors Class of 2006

You have crossed the halfway milestone! As juniors you need to continue to build a strong academic base and achieve the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that will serve you well after high school. You also need to seriously examine the results of the career exploration you have done up to this point. Juniors also face a number of critical standardized tests that provide them opportunities to demonstrate their achievement and abilities. These tests are:

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The New Juniors Class of 2006 (Cont'd)

PSAT/NMSQT

The PSAT is a practice test that prepares juniors for the SAT. The PSAT is also the test that is used for the National Merit Scholarship Program. Juniors across the nation who achieve the highest scores in their state on this test may be eligible to receive a number of prestigious recognitions and scholarships. The PSAT will be offered *Saturday October 16, 2004*.

ACT

The ACT is College Admissions Exam. The ACT will be given at St. Charles North High School on **Saturday October 23**, 2004 and again **Saturday**, **April 9**, 2005. These dates are national administration dates. ACT scores from national test administration dates are required for NCAA initial eligibility. Some scholarships also require ACT scores from national test administrations. College bound juniors are encouraged to take a nationally administered ACT assessment.

PSAE

The PSAE is a set of tests required by the State of Illinois to assess the progress of all Illinois juniors in reaching the State Learning Standards. These tests will be administered to all juniors on *Wednesday*, *April 27 & Thursday*, *April 28*, *2005*. The tests include a full ACT assessment on the first day and a set of State developed exams and ACT WorkKeys assessments on the second day. The PSAE scores are placed on each student's transcripts.

SAT

The SAT is a College Admissions Exam. It is designed to provide information regarding a student's verbal and mathematic ability. Juniors should check the colleges to which they plan to apply to determine if they need to take the SAT. The SAT will be offered at St. Charles North on **Saturday**, **June 4**, **2005**.

ILLINOIS CONSUMER EDUCATION PROFICIENCY TEST

Students may take the ICEPT to meet the State requirement that students take a consumer education course. The test is offered October and January.

TEST PREPARATION

Taking academically challenging courses and working hard to do well in these courses is the absolute best test preparation activity for any student. Juniors may also improve their performance on standardized tests by doing anything that helps them to better understand the test, how it works and effective strategies for taking that particular test. There are books and electronic resources available in the Learning Resource Center that students can use to prepare for these tests. There are also very good on-line websites designed to help students prepare. Students can take the PLAN test as sophomores to prepare for the ACT. Students can take the PSAT as sophomores or juniors to prepare for taking the SAT. Taking practice tests found in ACT or SAT preparation books can provide valuable experience.

There are a number of private companies that offer specialized courses designed to prepare students for specific tests. A list of these companies and courses can be found on the PPS website. Several courses will be offered at St. Charles North during the 2004-05 school year.

PSAT 240. This seven week PSAT/NMSQT preparation course will be offered by ExcelEdge to St. Charles North students on Tuesdays from August 31 to October 12th. This course will help students analyze the PSAT, practice questions relating to the verbal, writing, and math components of the test, and master the pacing required to complete the test. While ExcelEdge has designed this course specifically for students who are in the top 15% of their class, it can assist and is open to all juniors who wish to take the PSAT. Students interested in taking the PSAT 240 will be able to pick up registration packets and fee information in the guidance office in June. The cost of the program will be \$180. The deadline for registration is August 20th.

ACT 36. ExcelEdge will offer it's *ACT* preparation course at St. Charles North. This course provides its students with an indepth practice on the *ACT*. The course will begin January 24^{th} and finish on March 21^{st} . The cost of the program will be \$182. The deadline for registration will be December 13^{th} .

TEST PREPARATION (Cont'd)

Huntington Learning Center's SAT Preparation Course. The Huntington Learning Center will provide an SAT preparation course beginning on January 18, 2005, and ending on May 3, 2005. Information regarding course costs and registration will be available in November.

UNDERSTANDING YOUR TARGET ACT SCORE AND EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

The ACT Assessment score is one of several very important reflections of overall academic achievement for juniors. It is one of several pieces of data that the State uses to assess whether a student has made progress toward meeting the Illinois State Standards for Learning.

Students frequently want to know what score on the ACT would reflect that they have personally made improvement. There are fixed targets that they can consider. An ACT score of 36 would be perfect; and, a score of 30 or above is generally considered outstanding. Scores of 22 or better are generally required for selective to highly selective colleges. Many traditional colleges require scores of 20 or above for admission; and, scores of 18 to 21 usually are sufficient to get a student into a liberal college. While fixed targets are useful, the real question is whether you are making expected achievement gains.

One way of knowing this is to compare your ACT scores with your scores the EXPLORE test taken in 8^{th} grade or the PLAN test you may have taken as sophomore. The EXPLORE, PLAN, and ACT scores can be compared directly because they measure the same thing (i.e., student academic achievement in English, Math, Reading and Science) and they use the same scale scores. A score of 14 on the EXPLORE test is the same as a score of 14 on the ACT.

The ACT Corporation has given thousands of EXPLORE, PLAN and ACT tests. ACT's data show that students can be expected to increase their score from the EXPLORE to the PLAN by two scale score points with no special interventions. Further, students can be expected to increase their score from the PLAN to the ACT by four scale score points with no special interventions. By knowing your EXPLORE or PLAN scores, you can predict the minimal target score you would need to achieve on the ACT to show expected academic progress. If you make minimally expected academic progress, your Target ACT score should be four points higher than your sophomore PLAN score and six points higher than your 8th grade EXPLORE score.

TARGET ACT = EXPLORE + 6 or TARGET ACT = PLAN + 4

It should be the goal of every student to exceed expected growth. By examining the results of your EXPLORE or PLAN tests, taking challenging courses, and working to improve your areas of relative weakness, you will have a great opportunity to exceed expected achievement.

CAREER AND COLLEGE PLANNING

As a junior, two major tasks that you face are the selection of a potential career area and the identification of the kinds of post high school education necessary to enter careers in that area. Having a clear career focus and a post-high school plan adds significant personal meaning to the academic work you do in each of your classes. Students with well-defined career and college goals tend to perform better throughout their junior and senior years.

The online interest and skills inventories that you can take through *CareerCruising* and *The Discover Program* can assist you with these tasks. (See the "Career and College Search" in the seniors' section above.) Each of these programs has inventories that can link you immediately to careers that may be of interest to you. These same programs can also link you instantly to schools and colleges that provide programs in the careers of interest to you. On April 28th the counselors gave you paper and pencil copies of the interest inventory from the Discover Program and showed you how to use the results to begin your career search.

The New Sophomores Class of 2007

You have completed your first year of high school! While graduation may seem a distant goal, time will pass quickly. As sophomores you will build a strong foundation for your future in two ways. First you will continue to work hard to build a strong academic record by challenging yourself to do your absolute best in all of your classes. Second, you will begin to define your long-term career goals. These goals will help guide your work in high school and will define the kinds of post-high school education you will seek. Several important activities will help you with this task.

Continue to Work With Your Holland's Self Directed Search Materials. On April 29th the counselors gave freshmen the Holland's Self Directed Search (SDS). The SDS is a self-administered, self-scored, and self-interpreted career guidance tool that helped you begin to think about the kinds of activities you like, the skills you have, and the occupations that interest you. The SDS can help you define more clearly your vocational aspirations by reassuring you that your interests and skills fit the careers in which you are interested and by helping you to think about the wide range of alternative careers that your interests and skills match, but that you have not thought about. The PLAN Test. The PLAN test is designed by the ACT Corporation to help sophomores prepare to take the ACT as juniors. In addition the PLAN test provides students valuable career interests information. The PLAN test is scheduled for Saturday November 13, 2004. In December there will be a PLAN interpretation meeting to help sophomores better understand and use their results to prepare for both the ACT and in making important career decisions.

Mark your calendar for August 13th and plan on attending the Freshmen Orientation. During the orientation new freshmen will be provided a comprehensive overview of the school, its expectations, and what they need to do to be successful. Freshmen parents are invited to attend a Freshman Parent Orientation on August 18th from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. or from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. These sessions will cover much of the information covered on the 13th with your son or daughter; and, they will provide helpful hints on helping your son/daughter make a smooth transition to high school.
