Last winter, through the Office of Student Activities, students worked through a city government process in getting an electronic reader board sign ordinance changed. Last spring, the city approved and authorized an amendment to the reader board sign ordinance that allowed the students to move forward with their collaborative class gift. The class gift has finally arrived and was installed on our campus during the month of September. Congratulations and thank you to the Classes of 2003 and 2004.

Through this hard work, we have continued to enjoy success in music, theater, special interest clubs and a comprehensive athletic program. Our boy's varsity cross-country team finished $2^{\text {nd }}$ at 60 th the Peoria Woodruff and the West Aurora Invitational and were team champions at the Downers Grove South Invite. Both our sophomore and varsity boys' cross-country teams were champions at our own $\mathcal{N}$ orth Star Invite. This weekend they head to Peoria, Ilfinois to represent St. Charles $\mathcal{N}$ orth $\mathcal{H}$ figh School at the IFSSA State Cross Country Meet. The girls' cross-country team performed well all season. Jenny Dinges has qualified for the IHSA State Cross Country Meet this weekend as well. Our football program had a very successful season. The varsity team went undefeated in UEC play with a perfect 7-0 record. Their season ended at the hands of the Rolfing Meadows Mustangs in a very entertaining playoff contest. The freshman football $\mathcal{N}$ orth Stars went undefeated this season with a perfect 9-0 record. The $\mathcal{N o r t h}$ Star 6oy's golf team had a successful season winning the DeKalb Invite and qualifying for the sectional tournament. The Girls golf team continued where they left off last season. They had an outstanding fall winning the Plainfield South Invitational, the $\mathcal{N}$ aperville $\mathcal{N}$ orth Invite, and the Elgin Invite. To top it all off, they won the Upstate Eight Conference title for the first time in school history and were IFSSA Regional Champions. Our boys soccer team won the St. Charles East invite in convincing fashion defeating the host Saints 4-0. They were defeated in regional play by a very good Geneva soccer team. The girls swim team continues to build momentum as we head toward the sectional meet. They were team champions at the Fenwick Invite and just this week finished $2^{\text {nd }}$ in the $U_{\text {EC }}$ meet. Our girl's tennis team won the Morton Invite this past fall. Freshman Megan Gow qualified for the IFSA State Tennis Championships by placing 3rd at the St. Charles East Sectional meet. Our girl's volleyball teams were awesome! The sophomores were team champions at our own invite and the freshman enjoyed a great deal of success throughout the season. The varsity volleyball team went undefeated in the UEC finishing with a perfect 8-0 record. They won the St. Charles $\mathcal{N}$ orth Regional for the first time in school history and finished the season with an incredible 32-6 record. Way to go girls!

## Curriculum Corner

Excellence Through Collaboration Fall 2004. New teams of teacher have formed, determined needs, and set improvement goals from one of the following four goal types:

- Curriculum: designing or redesigning "what" students will learn (create, implement, and revise new lessons and/or units)
- Instruction: selecting "how" students will learn (select, implement, and analyze effectiveness of instructional strategies)
- Assessment: determining "how much" the students have learned (designing, implementing, analyzing assessment data formative and/or summative - to inform practice, revise lessons/units)
- SIP: working collaboratively to learn, implement, analyze, and reflect on implementation of one goal within our SIP plan (increasing student responsibility or increasing student ability to think and write effectively)

The goals the ETC teams selected and the work they are conducting focuses on enhancing teaching practice as well as understanding / documenting the relationship between those practices and increased student achievement. In order to do so, each team has created an action plan that includes the completion of 4 key steps: Step 1 - PLAN; Step 2 - DO; Step 3 - REFLECT; Step 4 - REVISE.

| Course/Group | Summary of Goals for ETC Fall 2004 Session |

| World History | We will plan a UBD unit for the Middle Ages in Ancient World History in order that students will show achievement of the unit's declarative and procedural standards (TBD) as evidenced by student performance on an authentic assessment (measured by a rubric) and student reflection. |
| US History | We will create a comprehensive binder of primary sources for US History. We will include citations and potential lessons in order that students show achievement of the Social Studies Standard 7 and all its indicators on all formative assessments leading up to and including the summative/"Common Assessment" for Junior year. |
| Social Studies | We will develop a progression of instructional strategies that will result in students demonstrating increased proficiency in meeting or exceeding the procedural social studies standards of information analysis and interpretation, effective research, and constructing support as evidenced by a common assessment grading rubric for those procedural standards. |
| American Studies | We will make use of the UbD Design Model to develop some common course questions, content, skills, and assessments in order to improve student achievement in this way: Clarifying expectations for students and articulating the integrated way of thinking and knowing. Students will show growth through improved performance on a second semester assessment requiring curricular connections. |
| Foreign Language | We will share current practice, explore student needs and best practices, and make suggestions for better articulation of the program years 1-5 in the content areas of Spanish and French in order to improve student achievement as evidenced by an online survey that will provide quantitative data regarding student attitudes and achievement of foreign language standards. |
| Latin | I will examine/revise the two years of Latin III and IV (and the authors read in order that students read and analyze classic literary works in order to better understand the development of Western Civilization as evidenced by final exam performance and student reflection data. |
| Algebra 1 | We will create a variety of assessments in the content area of Algebra 1 aligned with the CPM program in order to improve student achievement by measuring student learning and progress. |
| Algebra 2 | To design at least one investigative activity per unit for Algebra II L2, and analyze its effectiveness by using a ticket out the door. Additionally, formal pre-tests will be developed for each unit to create another way for students to self-assess and better prepare for formal assessments. |
| Calculus | We will design and assign problem sets based on AP-style questions for students in the area content area of Calculus in order to improve student achievement by allowing our students to be more prepared for the AP examination and to enhance students' understanding of fundamental calculus concepts. |
| Geometry | We will continue to develop the curriculum in the area content area of honors geometry in order to improve student achievement by helping them learn problem solving, complete expanded weekly problem sets and the use of a portfolio. |
| Geometry Honors | We will work collaboratively together to create a common final in order to improve student achievement by making up the semester exam now so that we can focus our instruction to achieve this goal. |
| Coop/ WECEP | We will redesign the curriculum for Coop and WECEP in order to make our Cooperative education classes more cohesive in order to improve student achievement in workplace skills, job search skills, career research, financial management, writing skills, oral communication skills. |
| Economics | We will redesign the insurance unit to incorporate content from summer workshop and align and create alternate assessments for all units in order to improve student achievement by allowing for more studentdriven curriculum and improve assessments by using data from assessments for curriculum decisions. |

| Art | We will develop a writing template for students' self-reflection of their artwork in order to improve student achievement we will pilot the template and revise as needed |

| English - Portfolio | We will facilitate and direct the use of writing portfolios in classrooms across the humanities. We will assess pieces placed in tracked portfolios in order to provide feedback to both teachers and students about areas of strength and weakness. We will also encourage students to be more reflective about the cognitive processes involved in writing and to make frequent use of writing strategies. |
| English - Reading | We will research and implement reading strategies to help students improve reading speed and comprehension in the content area of English in order to improve student achievement in this way we will give students the tools necessary to help them take ownership of their own learning. |
| English/Speech | In order to improve student achievement in the area of communication, we will establish communication skills (nonverbal and verbal) needed for a comprehensive four-year English program, focusing on the Freshman and Sophomore year, with teacher instruction support in the area content area of English. |
| Music - vocal | We will implement sight-reading materials into the curriculum, evaluating their effectiveness via assessment of student growth and learning. These new materials will be implemented into the curriculum at least on a bi-weekly basis and students will be assessed via performance on the sight-reading materials, as well as on their ability to apply the information to real world situations. |
| Music - Instrumental | We will design a program of video and written assessment to evaluate students' proficiency in the content area including: major scale knowledge and performance, rhythmic counting, and tone quality. |
| Product design \& architecture | Teachers will develop an online accessible learning tool for students of design related classes that will be usable by students outside of the classroom. |
| Technology | Teachers will work to create lessons, activities and opportunities for students to inform themselves about career options in technology related fields. |
| Physics | Teachers will plan, design and organize supplementary materials for students to further their understanding and abilities to meet science standards. |
| AP Biology | Teachers will work collaboratively to design curriculum, activities and or assessments that specifically relate to AP Biology that incorporate scientific reasoning skills such as those measured by the ACT and AP exams. |
| Scientific Reasoning | Teachers will design supplemental materials and or assessments that incorporate scientific reasoning skills for students such as those measured by the ACT and will seek to share these with all department members for regular use in all science classes. |
| RES and Earth Science | Teachers will work to design lessons, activities or assessments that incorporate technology into the curriculum of Earth Science and RES |
| Reading Remediation | We will analyze data from last year's KTEA testing, recent MAP results, and the soon to be administered John's Reading Inventory to determine areas of deficits, conduct research in remediation strategies and implement strategies for specific reading areas of need, and then post-test to determine any significant change. |
| Psychology/Sociology | Planning, implementing, analyzing and revising an integrated unit on homelessness. |
| PE I/II | Creating common assessments for the WSI, stroke mechanics and fitness foundation units in these courses with a focus on state and district 303 standards. |
| PE III/IV | Designing, implementing and analyzing a unit plan and curriculum for the cardiovascular disease unit. |
| FACS | Review and revise assessment tools used in Foods, Fashion Design and Child Development courses |
| Driver Education | Planning, implementing, analyzing and revising units that align instructional strategies with the classroom and behind-the-wheel assessment tools. |
| Academic Assistance | We will assess the effectiveness of the Academic Support evidenced by growth of students participating in the Applied Study program by collecting data and reflecting on academic support to revise our practices. |

Busy! Busy! The LRC started the year with a high level of teacher usage with the scheduling book filled to capacity many hours of the day. Online testing in the areas of mathematics and English took place on the computers in and adjacent to the LRC as well. Foreign language teachers used print materials and websites to enhance their curriculum, classes were treated to book talks on various fiction titles prior to selection for class projects, and business teachers used various websites to supplement their economics units.

Freshman English teachers have been bringing their classes into the LRC for orientation and technology-based information literacy. Research lessons have been coordinated with topics based on a book read in the English class. Students have then created a Powerpoint on their topic, to be later presented in class.

New laptops have been purchased this fall to replace some of the ones stolen in the burglary over the summer. The laptops have been placed in the mobile wireless carts, and carts are requested by teachers to be placed in a classroom for a particular hour to access programs on the network and/or the Internet.

The LRC is participating in the upcoming St. Charles Reads Project. Copies of the chosen book, Peace like a River, along with suggested activities, have been made available to English teachers and librarians as well as several copies of the book being added to the library collection. The Physical Education Program is proud to announce great progress in the creation of their fitness lab. In early August the transformation of the "old" weight room began. In addition to the relocation of equipment, the vacant room was primed for renovation. This included the construction of a traversing wall! As our program continues to focus on lifelong fitness and activities, the traversing wall will enable students to enhance muscular endurance, communication, problem solving, and teaming skills.

For those unfamiliar with traversing, it is a form of horizontal rock climbing. The wall is eight feet tall and has various peaks and holds which allow for diverse degrees of difficulty. While Hallenbeck Expeditions installed the structure, the junior PE Leaders assisted with the placement of holds. Once that was completed and the PE staff discussed climbing safety, the wall was open for all PE classes to use.

Currently the fitness lab is comprised of the traversing wall, step aerobic equipment and stability balls. We continue to investigate funding internally and externally as we hope to include cardiovascular equipment such as spinner bikes, treadmills and elliptical machines. This will enable our students to measure and enhance their fitness levels in a variety of ways.

We are very thankful for the chance to provide our students with such unique opportunities and we invite you to come check the wall out.

GLOBAL STUDIES

As part of Rebecca Reber's World History class, students have been investigating what is meant by the Eastern Worldview. To address our Social Studies standard of "understanding how to explain, analyze, and show connections among patterns of historical change and continuity", students have analyzed the relationship between cultural expressions such as art, and belief. These relationships will enable students to draw conclusions regarding the values and behaviors of cultures across time and facilitate a deeper understanding of lives different from our own.

On November 3rd, students had the opportunity to explore Asian art first hand as they traveled to the Art Institute for a day and engaged in dialogue with an Asian art expert while participating in a tour of the Institute's Asian exhibits. Students will add this information to their on-going investigations, finally synthesizing their learning in a final project due in January.
