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North High School Students Win Alice Davis Awards

Each year the St. Charles Heritage Center recognizes high school students with the **Alice Davis Award**, an honor presented to those who exemplify scholarly, historical research by using primary sources of a local nature in a research paper or project.

This last summer, St. Charles North High School Senior **Stephanie Shirkey** received the award for her presentation on the history of the **Norris Family and Their Importance in St. Charles**.

Shirkey researched the family and the impact they had on the town by using primary documents and photographs from the Heritage Center. She then put together a video presentation showing the many gifts that the Norris family gave to St. Charles and narrated the story.


St. Charles North High School junior Matt Ball also received the award for his presentation on the history of Pottawatomie Park.

Using research documents, photographs, books, and personal accounts Ball put together a PowerPoint slide show detailing the history of the park and the land from the time the Native Americans lived on it through today.

The award is named after Alice Davis (1884-1966) a significant local historian, teacher, and principal who dedicated more than 50 years to the St. Charles school system. Perhaps best known of her many contributions to research in local history was *The Settlement and Growth of St. Charles* (1940). It was for many years the most widely circulated history of the community. The Heritage Center honors her lifelong pursuit of knowledge with this award.

Both students received certificates and checks for \$100.

The St. Charles Heritage Center operates two historic sites - the St. Charles History Museum and Gift Shop located at 215 E Main Street and the Dunham-Hunt House located at 304 Cedar Avenue.



During her summer break, St. Charles North Technology Education teacher Marsha Brown received training for the Project ProBase Pilot. This pilot is a National Science Foundationsupported curriculum project. Project ProBase is developing technology-based curricula that provide a comprehensive technical will foundation for students who will continue their education in community college technician education or four-year degree programs in engineering, architecture or related fields. 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"The Story of Mobile Classrooms"

The addition of 12 mobile classrooms to our facility will allow us to maintain class size at a level consistent with previous years. These facilities are self-contained with individual heating and cooling equipment for the comfort of the students and staff. In addition, they are integrated into all school-wide services including fire alarm, intercom, and available network technology. Appropriate permits to construct the facilities and occupancy permits to use these facilities were received through the Regional Office of Education in Kane County.

We are often asked how the location of the mobile classrooms was decided upon. As the Board of Education considers all options for accommodating students, the potential need for space through additional construction projects becomes a possibility. Locating mobile classrooms where future construction might take place is not feasible in terms of scheduling of construction projects or legitimate in terms of economics. Moving mobile classrooms a second time in order to accommodate construction is not prudent economically. Thus, mobile classrooms are typically located in an area that is as convenient as possible for student use, yet not in an area that might support additional permanent facilities.

The four rooms in front of the school will be used as lunch/study facilities. As you are aware, our students eat lunch in ½ of a class period or 24 minutes. The other ½ period they are assigned to a formal or informal study hall. Placing the mobile facilities in front of the school provides our students with convenient access to the cafeteria resulting in a few minutes of additional lunch time. Also, it will no longer be necessary for students to travel through the academic wing of the building during regular class time for their lunch/study assignment. This will help reduce interruptions to those classes in session and reduce congestion in the hallways. The eight mobile classrooms on the south side of the building will be used entirely for regular classroom instruction. These classrooms will also have access to all educational and safety school-wide services.

Finally, the Board of Education through Superintendent Barbara Erwin has authorized an additional non-certified staff member who will help supervise the exterior areas of the building to ensure safety and security for these facilities. The rear driveway of the building will be blocked off in limited areas so that student access to these classrooms can be accomplished safely and in a timely fashion. This additional campus monitor will also assist with parking lot supervision to ensure safety before and after school.

While the presence of mobile classrooms indicates a time of rapid enrollment increases, the District and the building Administration is doing everything possible to provide appropriate and equivalent instructional experiences. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

NEW DATABASES AVAILABLE FROM THE LRC

The Learning Resource Center has changed some of the online databases available for this school year. The EBSCO "Ultra" database, a comprehensive database designed for high school libraries, contains full text for nearly 500 popular magazines, 88,000 biographies, over 500 pamphlets, 150 reference books and 60,000 primary source documents. The EBSCO group of databases also includes Newspaper Source, a full text coverage database of more than 200 newspapers. Separate databases in the area of health, history, education, literature and science are also part of the subscription. All databases are available from any computer at school and from home. Passwords for home use are included in this issue of the Navigator. It is recommended that the passwords be placed on or near your computer monitor for later use.

National Honor Society Selection Process Begins!

National Honor Society is a national organization that recognizes high school students who excel in the areas of scholarship, character, leadership and service. Junior and senior students with a GPA of 4.5 on the weighted and un-weighted scale are eligible for the selection process every fall. Those students that meet the GPA requirement will be sent a letter in the beginning of September inviting them to participate in the selection process. They will also receive a packet which details the process and the steps that are necessary in order to be considered. Parents and students will have two opportunities to meet with the advisors to ask any questions prior to submitting the packet. The Faculty Council, consisting of five staff members who are not NHS advisors or building administrators, will meet to anonymously evaluate the criteria of all candidates. The Faculty Council

nominates candidates who excel in all four of the pillars of National Honor Society—character, scholarship, leadership, and service. These candidates will be inducted in November.

Membership in NHS is an honor and a privilege. All members are expected to complete 20 service hours in the school and community for each year of membership, as well as maintain their GPA. The St. Charles North chapter of National Honor Society sponsors numerous service projects including school-wide blood drives, peer tutoring, a Veteran's Day all-school assembly, ice cream socials for senior citizens prior to theatrical productions, a doughnut eating contest which raises money to shop for D303 elementary school children who need clothing and school supplies, and numerous other activities which promote the ideals of National Honor Society.

"Once Upon a Homecoming"

Friday, September 24th marks the beginning of this year's Homecoming, entitled "Once Upon a Homecoming" with a Fairy Tale and Nursery Rhymes theme. Students will begin to build their class floats at designated sites on that Friday and continue to construct them until Thursday, September 30th at 10 pm. On **Thursday** organizations nominating couples to the Homecoming Court will be decorating their parade golf cart in the courtyard after school and classes will finish floats.



- On <u>Friday</u> we will have the parade at 2 pm on Main Street, St. Charles. The football team will host St. Charles East in the Cross River Classic and the Drill Team will host their Kick-a-thon between the Sophomore and Varsity games. Homecoming King and Queen will be announced after the Kick-a-thon and the Spirit Flag from class competition will be announced during the halftime program of the Varsity game. Spectators are reminded to stay after the Varsity game for North's annual homecoming fireworks.
- Students are then invited on <u>Saturday</u> to the homecoming dance in the Main Gym, capping an entire week of activities for our SCN students.

SENIOR CLASS NOTES

Best Advice for Seniors.....

The decisions you make this year will be among the most important decisions of your life. Your challenge will be to enjoy the wonderful activities of a senior year while maintaining a high degree of focus and effort toward a strong academic finish. The best advice for your senior year remains, "Do not miscalculate." Your senior information packet provides important information, including a current transcript of courses taken. Double and triple check the courses listed on your transcripts against the requirements for graduation. If you have questions, contact your counselor. (Senior students need to pick up a Senior Packet from the Guidance Office as soon as possible)

PSAE Retakes

In your senior packet you have received your Prairie State Examination Scores. The State of Illinois allows seniors the opportunity to improve their PSAE scores by retaking both days of the PSAE in October. Notify Dr. Lane in the Guidance Office by September 17th if you want to retake the test. The retake tests will be scheduled for October 23rd (Day One ACT) and October 26th (Day Two Prairie State Exams and WorkKeys). Students must take both days if they choose the retake option.

Senior College Information Night

On October 4th from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. the Guidance Department will present a Senior College Information Night. In this presentation counselors will highlight the key issues involved in the final stages of the college selection process. Guidance counselors will be available to answer questions and share their insights into this important stage of the transition to college. While this program is specifically designed for seniors and their parents, all are welcome to attend.

Financial Aide Nights

The Fox Valley School Financial Aide Night will be held this year at Geneva High School on December 4th at 7:30pm.
