North Star Unsung Heroes

A new recognition program was unveiled with the first annual "Unsung Heroes Awards" ceremony which took place on February 10th in the school Auditorium. This award was created to honor and applaud the "behind the scenes" students who are the unpretentious helpers, the givers, always anticipating the needs of the classroom, the activity or the sport. These special students are there as a constant unassuming reminder of the "goodness" that occurs everyday in our school community.

Mr. Joe Dittmar, a survivor of the 911 World Trade Towers, was the guest speaker at the ceremony. The expression "you could hear a pin drop" was never more true as students, parents, and staff listened to Mr. Dittmar describe the fateful day that made "Unsung Heroes" out of ordinary people. Mr. Dittmar explained that he was attending a business meeting on the 105th floor of Two World Trade Center. One of only seven survivors of the 54 attending the meeting, Mr. Dittmar gave an inspirational insight into one of the most incredible events in US history. His story provided a wealth of lessons about how we proceed with our daily lives. His message dealt with not only our vulnerability but also the impact of human determination and how we can all make a difference in our day-to-day lives.

I have traveled one of the most incredible professional journeys one can imagine. A native of Peoria, I graduated from Illinois State University in December of 1975 and taught high school English for the next seventeen years in Minonk, Geneseo, Waukegan, and Gurnee, Illinois. Our business partnerships have grown and produced such wonderful entities as the Hewitt Career Center. We have continually worked to incorporate more outside resources to build on our community's diversity.

From my experience at Waukegan, I have gained a deeper understanding of the trust that our community places in us as we educate their students. Whether a teacher or administrator, I have always held as my constant, my Polaris, the students. Early on, I adopted from one of my mentors, a simply phrased question on which I base my decisions: How is what I want to do beneficial for students? As long as the students for whom I work are the focus, I never have to question my motivations or priorities. Seeing success in the eyes of a high school student is by far the greatest reward for all that is done in schools.

I look forward to continuing my career at St. Charles North High School. To be a part of such a superb community is an honor beyond imagination. I pledge to respect and continue the fine work that is underway. Thank you for this opportunity.

A SNAPSHOT OF THE LRC

Freshman English teachers have been bringing their classes into the LRC for a new unit dealing with adversity. Students are researching for fiction and non-fiction materials on a topic personally relevant to them. Many students are using materials borrowed from local public libraries in addition to our resources. Students without library cards at the local public library request materials through the North LRC. Web pages for the adversity project can be found linked from the school LRC site under the curriculum links for English.

Sophomores are involved in a multicultural independent reading project. Students are reading books by authors from other countries and/or other ethnic groups. Many of the books are chosen based on book talks given by the librarians to introduce the wide variety of books present in the LRC collection.

Some biology students are producing brochures on genetic diseases using Microsoft Publisher. The brochures, designed to provide information regarding the disease, will be printed in color before being turned in to the science teachers.

Students in some Spanish classes are showing their creativity with restaurant menus. The menus, in Spanish of course, are printed in color using the LRC's laser printer.

And, of course, we are still working on getting the first semester textbooks back that are overdue. Textbooks from first semester classes that ended in January are overdue and should have been returned, but an amazing number of students don't return them on time. Why would they want to keep the book for a class they no longer have? An age-old question for librarians!

USED BOOK DRIVE – BOOK WORM ANGELS



Students in the AP Biology classes are doing a service project to provide gently used books to students in Chicago schools. The vast majority of

students in over 190 schools in Chicago's inner city are reading below grade level. To help solve this problem our students are having a book collection drive in March. Students will be asked to bring in slightly used "fun" books suitable for students pre-kindergarten through eighth grade. Donations can be dropped off at the LRC at North High School through March 23. This is a great "kids helping kids" program to improve literacy and we appreciate your help in making this project a success. The books will be donated to BOOK WORM ANGEL, whose mission is to put lending libraries in each classroom in Chicago elementary schools where so many children are reading below grade level. Over 14,000 at-risk children now can borrow books right in their classrooms. 170,000 books have been collected to date and put into 22 inner city schools. International Studies: School-in-a-Box

After having studied in great detail worldwide human rights violations and concerns, Mrs. DiTella's International Studies classes joined together and purchased a "school-in-a-box" from UNICEF for victims of the horrible Tsunami tragedy.

Upon first hearing about the tremendous suffering and casualties in south Asia, the International Studies students were sympathetic and felt compelled to do something to help with the recovery. The students independently researched opportunities for donations and actively looked for unique ways to assist the suffering people. Both classes took a vote and decided that third period student Denise Gonzalez-Menendez's idea of purchasing a "school-in-a-box" was the best suggestion.

A "school-in-a-box" is a pre-packaged kit that provides basic education to children whose lives have been disrupted by the events surrounding the Tsunami. The kit contains basic educational supplies such as: exercise books, pencils, erasers, posters, and scissors. Teachers have been known to create makeshift classrooms using the "school-in-a-box" in order to ensure the continuation of education in the case of an emergency.

Every International Studies student donated money and both classes combined were able to purchase a kit that would ultimately benefit around 80 students living in south Asia.

The French students are in their second year of studying English and are currently writing letters in English to our students. Our students will be writing back in French. 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MATH TEAM

The Math Team qualified 11 students for the ICTM **State** Math Contest at the ICTM **Regional** Math Contest on Saturday, February 26. Twenty-one students competed at the ICTM Regional. This is North's second year for participating in the ICTM math contests. The State Math Contest will be held on Saturday, April 30 at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. In February, 346 North math students joined over 200,000 of the top math students in North America in the American Mathematics Contests (AMC-10) and AMC-12), an annual test for advanced math students sponsored by the Mathematics Association of America. This year, ten students (up from four last year) qualified for the prestigious American Invitational Mathematics Examination, to be held on March 8. Nine students qualified by scoring at least 100 points on the AMC-12, which places them in the top 5% of all advanced math students nationally. One student qualified by scoring over 120 points on the AMC-10, placing him in the top 1% of freshman and sophomore advanced math students nationally.

Prairie State Achievement Examinations are April 27th and 28th

On April 27th and 28th all juniors at St. Charles North High School will take the Prairie State Achievement Exam (PSAE). The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) requires that all schools give the PSAE to their juniors in order to:

- Assess the extent to which students in the eleventh grade are meeting the Illinois Learning Standards, that is, the specific knowledge and skills that students should learn in Illinois public schools,
- Provide for school accountability, and
- Recognize the achievement of individual students in meeting the learning standards.

The PSAE Test include the following components:

Day 1: ACT Assessment English – 45 minutes (75 questions)

ACT Assessment Mathematics – 60 minutes (60 questions)

15 minute break

ACT Assessment Reading – 35 minutes (40 questions)

ACT Assessment Science Reasoning – 35 minutes (40 Questions)

Day 2: ISBE-Developed Science – 40 minutes (40 questions)

Work Keys Applied Mathematics – 45 minutes (33 questions)

15 minute break

Work Keys Reading for Information – 60 minutes (60 questions)

The requirements for conducting the PSAE will make April 27th and 26th unique days for all students and staff at St. Charles North. A number of adjustments in the normal operations of the school will occur on these days.

It is very important that each junior does his or her very best on this exam. The individual scores from each of the four PSAE subjects are listed on the student's transcript. Students have the opportunity to earned Prairie State Achievement Awards and to have those awards listed on their transcript. ACT Assessment scores from the PSAE can be listed on a student's transcript and can be used by colleges for admissions and the Illinois Student Assistance Commission to determine financial aid.
