
Student Planners

Crosstown Classic Championship Trophy

At the end of the 2004-05 school year, Dr. Erwin, Superintendent of Schools, presented the first Crosstown Classic Championship trophy to St. Charles North High Athletic Director John Rutter.

The year-long competition entails the two District 303 high schools earning points for each contest won against the other. St. Charles North took the first championship by earning 12.5 points, to East High's 8.5.

"I congratulate everyone involved in this great event," Erwin said. "A little good-natured rivalry can be a very positive way to promote strong relationships and strengthen our bonds," she said.

The contest was always on the students' minds, especially during some of the less-publicized events, Rutter said. "Our athletes were very aware of the competition," he said.

Starting last fall, the two schools' boys' and girls' varsity teams competed in 23 regular-season matches. Tournament and state competitions did not count. During the track and cross country events when North and East did not face off against each other, the schools won points based on their conference meets.

Boys' sports include: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track, volleyball and wrestling.

Girls' sports include: badminton, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and volleyball.

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Curriculum Corner

Secondary School Redesign. St. Charles North High School has entered into a partnership with the Education Alliance from Brown University to begin a thorough analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of our school and to devise a comprehensive plan for future improvements. At the core of this work is the assumption that student achievement can be increased by focusing improvement efforts in three areas: Providing Rigorous Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment; Personalizing the Learning Environment; and Building Collaborative Leadership / Professional Learning Communities. The diagram below represents the research-based recommendations outlined in Breaking Ranks II: Strategies for Leading High School Reform, published in 2004 by The National Association of Secondary School Principals and The Education Alliance from Brown University. This document will guide the work in Secondary School Redesign for the months and years to come. Parents, students, and staff will have on-going opportunities to participate in this multi-faceted initiative.




Diagram by John Clarke, Steering Group, Vermont's "High Schools on the Move"

KATRINA RELIEF

North students and staff raised money and collected food and personal hygiene items for the Katrina relief effort. Here are a few examples of how North students and staff were able to contribute:

A 'friendly competition' between four of Mrs. Reber's sophomore social studies classes over four days resulted in \$2,062.97 collected for the American Red Cross. The students all were amazingly generous and some even went door-to-door in their neighborhoods to add to the total amount. The winning class was 8th hour Ancient World History, with over \$1,100.00 collected.

Mrs. Reber and Ms. Foy organized a collection effort for personal hygiene items. Boxes were placed in the Main Foyer and were quickly filled with thousands of items. The donations were sent to Mississippi for distribution to several shelters.

Students in Mrs. Williams' AP English class and Miss Fasbender's Am Lit class engaged in a friendly competition and raised over \$1,000 in one hour.

The SCN Cheerleaders collected \$1,700 at the first home football game, and also in conjunction with EFS Bank held a relief drive for monetary donations as well as clothing, baby items, books, and games for small children.

The Football Booster Club is donating all money made on the sales of its program this year.

The School Store sponsored a change drive during lunch hours.

Student Council has pledged to donate the proceeds of its annual Homecoming Penny Wars competition which raised around \$2,000 last year.

Girls' Tennis Team hosted a tennis camp for 3rd-6th graders to benefit the victims and evacuees. Twenty percent of the \$10 fee was donated to the relief fund. The players shared basic skills to the young tennis players.

Mr. Kuper's social studies classes donated a total of \$934.88 for the American Red Cross. The competition among classes lasted five days and was won by the 2nd hour American History class that is team-taught with Ms. Monaco. The 2nd hour class raised \$440.50.

Boys' Soccer with the help from the Drill Team sponsored a car wash and gave half of the proceeds to the relief fund. Likewise, Girls Volleyball took half of the proceeds from their carwash and purchased needed supplies to donate to the hurricane victims.

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SENIOR CLASS NOTES

Finish Strong!

The decisions you make during your senior year will be among the most important decisions of your life. This year will require a tremendous amount of focus, balance, and effort. While enjoying the activities of a senior year, you will need to maintain a high degree of effort to have a strong finish to your high school academic career. Colleges and future employers look carefully at your last year. Students who "take it easy" after three years of hard work, are often surprised by the negative impacts this can have on their opportunities.

The best advice for your senior year is, "Do not miscalculate." Seniors received a senior information packet that provided important information, including a current transcript of courses taken. Double and triple check the courses listed on your transcripts against the requirements for graduation. If you have questions, contact your counselor. It is extremely important that you know both what you need to graduate and to keep the doors to the opportunities you want after high school wide open.

PSAE as a Condition of Graduation

Seniors should be reminded that State law requires that they must take the PSAE in order to receive a diploma. Any student who has not taken the PSAE should check with their counselors to make sure that they can do what is necessary to meet this requirement.

"Applying and Getting Into Your Dream College"

On September 20th the Guidance Department presented "Applying and Getting Into Your Dream College." Some of the highlights are summarized below.

- Factors to consider in looking for a college include: location, size, academic program, admissions requirements, expenses and financial aide, housing and facilities, activities and clubs, special programs, and crime statistics.
- Work to narrow your search to two "safe" schools you know you can get into and afford, two "target" schools that you want to get into, and two "reach" schools that would be a stretch, but would offer great opportunity.
- Check the guidance office or the PPS web page to get lists of web sites that provide college, career, and military information.
- Use Career Cruising and eDiscover to look for college information.
- Visit colleges and when you do: 1) take an unofficial transcript with you; 2) do a campus tour; 3) attend a class; 4) visit a residence hall; 5) talk to students and faculty; 6) talk to the admissions and financial aide offices; 7) visit on a normal weekday, not a weekend; 8) use Columbus Day or institute days for visitations; 9) take notes for each school visited.
- Follow the College Application Process and its deadlines to assure that your applications arrive on time. Below are reminders regarding the process:
 - Apply early! Apply early! Apply early! Colleges strongly recommend applying early to assure that your application is given careful consideration.
 - Obtain and complete an application for each school in which you are interested. A good college search process will
 narrow this number to less than ten schools.
 - Complete all parts of the application that are required for you to fill out and have someone check your work.
 - Include any essays, letters of recommendations, application fee, and an addressed envelope with the proper amount of postage.
 - Use good writing techniques (e.g. PAR) when writing essays. Pay attention to ideas, organization, and conventions.
 - Fill out a transcript release form for each application and include \$1.00 for each request. If your application needs to be post-marked by a particular date, that date needs to be noted on your transcript request.
 - Bring all of the above to the Guidance Office and give it directly to Mrs. Zoerlein or your counselor. Do not leave applications on desks or counters.
 - Keep a file that contains copies of all vital documents (e.g. applications, essays) for your records.
 - If you apply on line, remember that you still need to request that a transcript be sent. It is also wise to print a copy and have your counselor review it before you hit the send button.
 - It is extremely important to: 1) Check each school's application deadlines and turn the application in a minimum of two
 weeks before the due date.
 - Applications due by January 1st must be received in the Guidance Office one week before holiday break begins to ensure
 that they are received on time. If a counselor recommendation is requested, they must be turned in a minimum of two
 weeks before the holiday break.

Financial Aide. On December 1, 2005 at 7:30 p.m. the Fox Valley Schools sponsor a Financial Aide Night at Geneva High School. The SCNHS Guidance Department is planning a second smaller session at 7:00 pm. on January 10, 2006. In addition to these resources an excellent resource is collegezone.com a website sponsored by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

SENIOR CLASS NOTES (cont'd)

Scholarships. A number of scholarships are offered each year to seniors at St. Charles North High School by a variety of businesses, clubs, and community organizations. Available scholarships are publicized through the student announcements. Students who are interested in these scholarships should see Mrs. Porter in the Guidance Office.

NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. The NCAA requires all new Division I or II college athletes to meet specific initial and ongoing eligibility requirements. Coach Bobbie Cesarek, Northern Illinois University's NCAA Compliance Director spoke on the initial eligibility requirements on October 5th in the St. Charles North Auditorium. Her presentation helped students and their parents understand the initial eligibility requirements and the NCAA rules for recruiting athletes.

JUNIOR CLASS NOTES

TESTS

Testing, both for college entrance and for assessment of State Learning Standards, represents an important task for Juniors. Below is a summary of the tests juniors should consider taking.

PSAT. The PSAT/NMSQT measures skills that are important for success in college including verbal reasoning, math problem-solving, and writing. Taking the PSAT enables students to: 1) Practice for SAT Program tests; 2) seek information from colleges; 3) get feedback about critical academic skills; and, 4) enter the National Merit Scholarship competition.

The PSAT, a practice version of the SAT I, will be administered on Saturday, October 15, 2005 at St. Charles North. Juniors and Sophomores can register in the guidance office through October 7, 2005. The cost is \$20.00.

ACT. The ACT national tests are offered throughout the Chicago area on October 22, December 10, February 11, April 8 and June 10. St. Charles North will be an ACT test site on October 22, 2005 and April 8, 2006. Registration packets can be obtained in the guidance office. The School Code for SCNHS is 143796.

SAT. The SAT national tests are offered throughout the Chicago area on October 8, November 5, December 3, January 28, April 1, May 6, and June 3. St. Charles North will be an SAT test site on Saturday June 3, 2006. Registration packets can be obtained in the Guidance Office.

PSAE. The PSAE is a set of tests required by the State of Illinois to assess the progress of all Illinois juniors in reaching the State Learning Standards. These tests will be administered to all juniors on April 26 & 27, 2006. The tests include a full ACT assessment on the first day and a set of State developed exams and ACT WorkKeys assessments on the second day. The PSAE scores are placed on each student's transcripts.

Illinois Consumer Education Proficiency Test. Students may take the ICEPT to meet the State requirement that students take a consumer education course. The test is offered October and January. Students should listen to daily announces for the registration dates.

BEGINNING THE COLLEGE SEARCH

On November 10, 2005 from 7 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. in the Auditorium, juniors and their parents are invited to attend "Searching for the University of Your Dreams." This presentation will provide you valuable information regarding how to look for and find the colleges or post-secondary training that will help you enter the career of your choice.

College Fairs. Juniors should plan on attending at least one of several large college Fairs. Elgin Community College will host a college fair the evening of October 4th, 6:00-8:30 p.m. The Fox Valley College Fair will be the evening of April 20th, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. Both of these college fairs host representatives from over a hundred colleges, universities, military academies and specialized training schools. The National Hispanic College Fair will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at East Aurora High School.

College Representatives. Visiting college representatives are posted in the student bulletins and on the College Information Bulletin Board. The following is the current visit schedule:

The PLAN Test

All Sophomores take the PLAN on November 1 and 3. The PLAN is designed by the ACT Corporation to help students prepare to take the ACT as juniors. It provides an estimated range of their ACT composite scores and information regarding their relative strengths and areas for improvement on the ACT. The PLAN also provides students valuable career interest information. On November 1 they will meet with their counselors to complete the non-test portion of the PLAN, including the career interest inventory. On November 3rd, they will complete the academic test portion of the PLAN. On January 12 a PLAN interpretation meeting will be held in the Auditorium. This meeting will help sophomores and their parents better understand and use the results to prepare for both the ACT and making important career decisions.

FRESHMEN CLASS NOTES

More Tips for Success

On October 11-13, freshmen will meet with their counselors during PE and Health classes to learn how they can make every year in high school count toward success. The challenge to all freshmen is to quickly learn what is expected at the high school level, to understand the rules of the school, and to develop the skills and habits that will lead you to a successful four years. Helpful suggestions for getting your high school career started on the right track include: 1) Set specific goals for yourself; 2) Get Involved!; 3) Ask for help; 4) Set clear priorities and manage your time wisely; 5) Be here every day possible; and, 6) Know your counselor and how to make appointments to see him or her when you have questions.

Dear Parents:

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLBA) requires all states to measure each public school's achievement and establish annual achievement targets. While District 303 and all seventeen schools achieved AYP in 2005, the District did not do so in 2003 or 2004. As a result, District 303 received Academic Early Warning Status. Consequently, the Illinois State Board of Education has requested that we distribute the parent notification letter from Donna Luallen, their accountability division administrator, and the 2005 District Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) Report.

A school or school district must achieve adequate yearly progress for two consecutive years to be removed from Academic Early Warning. In other words, achieving AYP in 2006 will result in a change in our status. Parents can access District 303's 2003 and 2004 State Report Cards by visiting the District 303 website (www.d303.org) and clicking on "About 303" and then, "State Report Cards, School Improvement Plans." 2005 School Report Cards for all District 303 schools will be posted in the same location in late October.

In accordance with the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001* (NCLB), states must provide notification to parents of students in districts that are identified for improvement because the district did not make adequate yearly progress. (See 20 U.S.C. § 6316 (c) (7)) This communication acts as the notification to meet this federal requirement.

The Illinois State Board of Education has asked your superintendent to distribute this letter and the 2005 AYP Status Report data to you. The data identifies why the district did not make adequate yearly progress (AYP). Under NCLB and state law, for a district to make AYP:

- 47.5% of the district's students (as a whole, and for certain subgroups) must exceed the state's targets in math and reading on state assessments;
- 95% of the district's students (as a whole, and for certain subgroups) must participate in state assessments for mathematics and reading; and
- (iii) the district's students (as a whole, and for certain subgroups) must meet an 89% attendance rate for grade schools and a 67% graduation rate for high schools.

If a district does not make AYP for two consecutive years, it is deemed to be in "improvement status" and certain state and federal sanctions apply. Two consecutive years of meeting AYP criteria are required for a district to be removed from "improvement status."

While AYP is an important measure of student learning, it is important to remember that a district that does not make AYP should never be considered a "failing" district. Teaching and learning is an ongoing process that changes constantly to meet the unique needs of students and communities. One of the most important goals of NCLB is to identify areas in each district and school where improvement is needed.

At the State Board, we feel it is important for educators, parents, and communities to work together to address those areas of need. Parents can assist districts in the improvement process by participating in improvement planning with the district and participating with local school improvement planning. If you are interested in helping your district in the improvement process, please contact your local school principal or superintendent.
