Looking forward to the fall of 2006, our School Improvement Team will be implementing several pilots. First, three classes of a freshman lunch advisory will be implemented, focusing on those skills needed to be successful in high school. Secondly, we will pilot a mentoring program with a group of tenth graders to provide more one-on-one guidance. Finally, several of our teachers will be hosting student-led conferences in their particular content areas. An overall focus for next year will be Professional Learning Communities. Beginning with freshman classes, teachers will be working with their content peers to measure student progress through a variety of means. These assessments will guide the teachers in the analysis and adaptation of their instruction to further assure student success. A group of teachers will also be investigating alternative use of study hall time as well as the use of technology to support student learning. Dr. Herrmann has outlined each of these projects and others under Curriculum Corner in this newsletter. Our School Improvement Team is energized and ready for the new year. We will work to always keep you updated as to our progress.

Finally, I wish to offer a deep felt congratulations to Dr. Denise Herrmann, Dr. Debbie Kling, and Mr. Bruce Lane as they move to new opportunities. Dr. Herrmann has accepted a principalship in Middleton, Wisconsin; Dr. Kling a principalship in Bloomingdale, IL; and Mr. Lane a directorship in Lockport, IL. - At our May PTO Meeting we reviewed a funding proposal submitted by SCN faculty members. 
