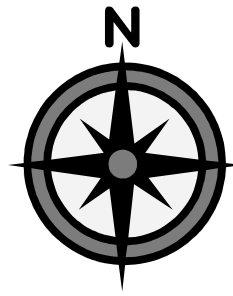

2007 NORTH STAR SCHOLARSHIP WINNER ANNOUNCED!

It is with great pride and pleasure that the North Star Scholarship Committee announces the winner of the 2007, \$10,000 North Star Scholarship. The award goes to senior Shannon Ratcliff!!

Shannon will attend Illinois State University in the fall and plans on studying Special Education. She would like to eventually teach in the St. Charles School District.

Shannon writes in her essay, "For the past two summers I have been a counselor at a camp sponsored through Fox Valley Special Recreation Association. Through this camp I discovered my passion for working with special needs teens. I have never had an experience where I laughed, smiled, shared, or learned so much."

She is currently working with a sixteen year old young man who is autistic through the Association for Individual Development.

Shannon has played soccer for 12 years and is a member of the SCN Girl's Varsity Soccer team. She is an active member of the Key Club and is also a part of Team Polaris, spending time encouraging the special needs students of the school to be involved in the school community.

This is the third year this scholarship has been awarded to a SCN senior. The first year Kristine Kaduk won the \$10,000 and she is now at the University of Illinois studying education. The second year winner was Michael Petkos who is studying Business at Northern Illinois University.

Criteria for this wonderful scholarship include playing a sport at North at least one year, working at a job to help earn money for college, at least a "C" GPA, and financial need.

REGISTRATION FOR 2007-08

As you read this, the registration process for 2007-08 is well under way for our current freshmen, sophomores, and juniors. The process began during the last week of January with presentations by teachers from the various Learning Areas informing students about the many different elective options available for next year. Also during that time students received a copy of the new Course Offering Book and Planning Guide and heard a presentation from counselors reviewing the course selection forms and course options. On January 31st, February 1st, and February 2nd all juniors met with their counselors individually to complete their course request forms. The sophomores did likewise on February 6th - 8th, as will the freshman on February 12th -14th. We ask that both the student and a parent sign the course request forms so counselors are confident that course decisions have been well-considered and are ready to be placed into the schedule system.

On or about February 22nd -24th course verification letters will be mailed home for students and parents to review and make any necessary changes. These changes can occur up until March 23rd, which is when the 2007-08 Master Schedule is built. During the period until March 23rd, you may want to take advantage of the opportunity to contact your counselor with any questions or additional guidance.

We encourage students and parents to review their four-year plan and consult the new Course Offering Book and Planning Guide, which is also available on the North web site, to guide the decision-making process.

“Pen of the Principal”

We at St. Charles North are committed to continuous school improvement.

Our belief is that as a school we do not do “initiatives”. Rather, school improvement is inherent to what we do. Our practices are aligned with, not added on to, the improvement in which we are already engaged. We believe that true school improvement is systemic and must reach students as quickly as possible.

As professional educators, our school time and our classrooms operate as collaborative learning communities. Content and classroom data are the tools we use in our Professional Learning Communities (PLC) to strategically increase our students’ classroom performance. We use this data as a springboard for discussions with our peers. Each course PLC team member uses these four questions to guide students’ classroom improvement:

- 1. What do our students NEED to know?*
- 2. How will we know the students know it?*
- 3. What will we do if the students do not know it?*
- 4. What will extend and enrich our students’ learning beyond the “need to know”?*

As a result of this direction, we as a staff believe that quality determines the merit of what we do. We believe that rigor is about the depth and complexity with which we can support our students in their mastery of the content. To effectively bring to life this vision, we are committed to the basic principle that all at North High School, students and staff alike, are a community of learners who openly share and embrace continuous learning and improvement.

This is the vision from which we work. As always, we will strive to be transparent in our operations, genuinely celebrating our students’ success and always looking for additional ways to support their learning. You are vital in what we do. Your feedback and suggestions are essential for our continual growth. We value our partnership with our families and the larger school community.

CURRICULUM CORNER

Academic Success for All Students

The St. Charles North teaching faculty is committed to the education of all of our students. At times, students need extra help for some classes. When a student finds that he is struggling or falling behind, he should make an appointment with his teacher for some individual work outside of class time. At the high school level, it is appropriate to expect students to take the responsibility to seek out assistance. The first level of conversation should always be between the student and the teacher.

If parents have questions about specific classes, an e-mail message or a phone call to the teacher is the first step to take. Note, however, that e-mail can be unreliable. We have discovered recently that in a few instances when teachers have replied to a few parents, the outgoing messages never arrived. If an e-mail to a teacher goes unanswered, it is suggested to follow-up with a telephone call.

If more assistance is required, contact the guidance counselor and/or the Instructional Coordinator.

We are all here to support each individual student. When teachers, parents, and, most importantly, students work together, students will maximize their learning.



Prairie State Achievement Examination

All 11th grade students in Illinois are required to take the Prairie State Achievement Exam (PSAE). This year's exam will be given during the school days of April 25th and 26th. Additionally, completion of the PSAE is a requirement for graduation from any public high school in the state.

The PSAE is a collection of tests designed to determine students' progress towards Illinois state standards. The first day of PSAE testing consists of an ACT exam, including tests in English, mathematics, reading, science reasoning, and writing. The second day of testing consists of a state-designed science test and two ACT-designed WorkKeys tests: Applied Mathematics and Reading for Information.

Most grade 12 students will be excused from school on April 25th and 26th to allow for sufficient space for PSAE testing. Some Advanced Placement courses will meet for an extended time on these dates to allow for a practice exam. Students in these courses will be expected to attend any assigned practice test sessions.

Advanced Placement Exams

The 2007 Advanced Placement exams are scheduled for May 7th to May 18th. Students who are currently enrolled in Advanced Placement courses at North will automatically be registered for the appropriate exam(s). Any student who wants to take an Advanced Placement exam for a class he/she is not enrolled in will need to register in the Guidance Office in late February/early March and pay the \$83 test fee.

**NEW EXCITING SCHOLARSHIP EXCLUSIVELY FOR
ST. CHARLES SENIORS!**



This is the inaugural year for the very exciting **HOWARD E. CHARLES, JR SCHOLARSHIP**. This scholarship is for students planning to study health-related fields in college. The Community Foundation of the Fox River Valley (formerly The Aurora Foundation), has been named as a beneficiary of the estate of Howard E. Charles, Sr. a former resident of St. Charles.

The bequest of \$3.4 million will be used to create this scholarship in memory of his son, Howard E. Charles, Jr.

This year, there will be **fifteen (15) \$3000 awards for high school seniors** and one (1) \$5000 award for a St. Charles graduate, pursuing a graduate degree in college. In the coming years, the dollar amounts will increase and winners can re-apply in college for the following three years.

Mr. Howard Charles, Jr. was born in Terre Haute, Indiana in 1928 and moved to St. Charles, where his father became a partner in the Burger Drug Store on Main Street. He was a graduate of St. Charles High School and the University of Wyoming. He then served in the US Air Force for four years.

Mr. Charles married and settled in Denver, Colorado, where he was a personnel director in the missile industry. He died in 1963 after a courageous battle with Hodgkin's disease.

The deadline for getting the finished applications in is February 7th, and the applications are now available in the Guidance Office.

Our FEA chapter will receive 60% of the funds they raised and will be using this money to help defray travel costs and program planning for the club.

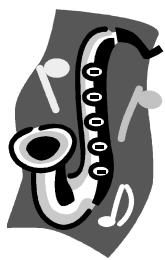
The North HS FEA chapter will be honored at the National Conference in February in San Diego, California.

SPANISH III CLASSES VISIT ART INSTITUTE

Spanish III classes took a field trip to the Art Institute of Chicago to enhance their appreciation of art that they previously studied. This field trip was a success because many students were able to see authentic paintings that were focused on in class by some of the greatest artists of all time; Picasso, Dalí, Monet, Miró, and Greco just to name a few.

By going to the Art Institute of Chicago, students were also able to incorporate the interdisciplinary studies of art, history, and Spanish. Students used vocabulary learned in the chapter to explain how they felt about the works of art when they saw them, the colors used, and the study/movement that the piece came from in the target language. Students took what was learned in the classroom and applied it to a real life setting.

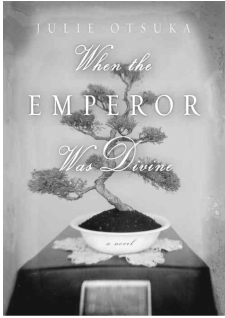
SCIENCE STUDENTS INVESTIGATE ENZYMES

What makes detergents work? This is the question students are investigating in our introduction to enzymes and their role in speeding up reaction rates. The students are testing a number of detergents to find out which is most effective in dissolving proteins. Stains with grass, blood, grape juice, and tomato sauce can be dissolved with the help of enzymes in the detergents. The ICB and Biology students will be learning about the way enzymes work in living systems and the factors which will impact their efficiency. The classes will then study how enzymes are made and what happens when certain enzymes are missing. This will culminate in a study of specific genetic disorders such as Sickle Cell Anemia and Cystic Fibrosis.

Watch in April as Community Unit School District 303, St. Charles Public Library, and Elgin Community College join forces to present a fascinating array of events centered on the bestselling book, **When the Emperor Was Divine**.

Julie Otsuka's first novel chronicles Japanese Americans caught up in the nightmare of the World War II internment camps. *Publishers Weekly* included the book as a starred review:

"The novel's honesty and matter-of-fact tone in the face of inconceivable injustice are the source of its power. Anger only comes to the fore during the last segment, when the father is allowed to tell his story – but even here, Otsuka keeps rage neatly bound up, luminous beneath the dazzling surface of her novel."

As a winner of the 2002 *New York Times* Notable Book Award, as well as the *Booklist* Editor's Choice award, Ms. Otsuka's programs will connect with students and adults who share the love of reading and writing. Her insight into this dark period of America's history will serve to enlighten, educate, and fascinate her audience.

During the school day, Ms. Otsuka will discuss her book with students at **St. Charles North High School on April 18th**. Later that day she will join the community at 7:00p.m at the St. Charles Public Library.
